Proposed Motion:

Approve Proclamation 2023-02, a Proclamation by the City of Lemoore Director of Emergency Services Proclaiming the Existence of a Local Emergency Pursuant to California Government Code §8550 et. seq.

Subject/Discussion:

The California Emergency Services Act, Government Code section 8550 authorizes the Council to proclaim local emergencies based on the “existence of conditions of disaster of extreme peril to safety of persons and property” caused by flood. On July 28, 2023 the City’s Director of Emergency Services proclaimed a local emergency due to flood conditions. The proclamation must be ratified within seven days by the Council.

The threat of conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property have arisen within the City of Lemoore caused by excessive precipitation and flooding, and local resources are insufficient to address the situation effectively.

Financial Consideration (s):

The declaration of a local emergency will help in making resources available and may provide some financial and administrative relief to help address the problems associated with flood risk.

RESOLUTION NO. 2023-24

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEMOORE RATIFYING AND EXTENDING THE PROCLAMATION OF LOCAL EMERGENCY ISSUED ON JULY 28, 2023 RELATED TO FLOOD CONDITIONS

WHEREAS, on July 28, 2023, the City of Lemoore Director of Emergency Services, City Manager Nathan Olson, issued a Proclamation declaring the existence of a local emergency, pursuant to Government Code section 8550 *et seq.* and Section 2-4-4 of the Lemoore Municipal Code, a true and correct copy of which is attached as Exhibit A (“Proclamation”); and

WHEREAS, the Proclamation was based on the actual or threatened existence of conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the City of Lemoore caused by the recent atmospheric river storms and winter weather events which have brought significant amounts of runoff and flooding to Kings County, surrounding agricultural lands, and throughout California in a short period; and

WHEREAS, the Proclamation was further based on the large amounts of snow accumulated in the Sierra Nevada Mountains and destined for the watersheds of the Kings River, the Kaweah River, the Tule River and Cross Creek, in relation to which the City anticipates more flood releases from Pine Flat Dam, Terminus Dam and Success Dam, and controlled flood flows in Tulare River, Dry Creek, Cross Creek and other streams, on both the east and west sides of the Valley; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds that the above conditions of peril constituted an imminent and proximate threat to public safety warranted and necessitated the Proclamation and that such emergency conditions continue to exist; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code section 8630, the local emergency shall not remain in effect for more than seven (7) days unless ratified by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to exercise its authority under Government Code section 8630 and Section 2-4-4 of the Lemoore Municipal Code to ratify the Proclamation and further to petition the Kings County Board of Supervisors and the Governor of the State of California for all assistance presently available to provide equipment, resources, manpower, and budgetary assistance in times of emergency.

WHEREAS, California Public Contract Code Section 22050(a) provides that in the case of an emergency, a public agency, pursuant to a four-fifths vote of its Governing Body, may repair or replace a public facility, take any directly related and immediate action required by that emergency, and procure the necessary equipment, services, and supplies for those purposes, without giving notice for bids to let contracts; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 22050(b), the City Council, by a four-fifths vote, may delegate, by resolution or ordinance, to the appropriate county administrative officer, chief engineer, or other nonelected agency officer, the authority to order any action pursuant to Section 22050(a).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Lemoore as follows:

1. The Proclamation issued by the City of Lemoore Director of Emergency Services on July 28, 2023, is hereby ratified.

2. The City Council petitions the Kings County Board of Supervisors and the Governor of the State of California for all assistance available including equipment, manpower, and budgetary resources to help to protect the life and property of the residents of the City of Lemoore under the current conditions of extreme peril.

3. The City Council finds that the above-described conditions further constitute emergency conditions within the meaning of Public Contract Code section 22050, which will not permit delay resulting from a competitive solicitation of bids for public works projects in relation to such conditions, and hereby authorizes the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into a public works contract or contracts directly related to and immediately required by said conditions, and to use, if necessary, day labor or force account for the performance of the work, including labor and furnishing of all materials or supplies in connection therewith, without advertising for or inviting bids. If the City Manager, or his designee, takes any action in accordance with this authorization, a report shall be made to the City Council justifying why the emergency would not permit a delay resulting from a competitive solicitation for bids and why the action was necessary to respond to the emergency. Said report shall be presented to the City Council, and City Council shall review the action, not later than seven (7) days after the action, or at its next regularly scheduled meeting if that meeting will occur not later than fourteen (14) days after the action.

4. The need for continuing this local emergency shall be reviewed as required by Government Code section 8630 and the City Council shall proclaim the termination of this local emergency at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant.

PROCLAMATION NO. 2023-02

A PROCLAMATION BY THE CITY OF LEMOORE DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY SERVICES PROCLAIMING THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY PURSUANT TO CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE §8550 et. seq.

WHEREAS, Section 2-4-4 of the Lemoore Municipal Code authorizes the Director of Emergency Services for the City of Lemoore (“Director”) to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of a local emergency when the City of Lemoore is affected or likely to be affected by the actual or threatened existence of extreme conditions of disaster and peril to the safety of persons within the City; and

WHEREAS, the Director is authorized to make this Proclamation when the City Council is not in session, in which case the Proclamation shall be sent to the City Council for consideration within seven days; and

WHEREAS, Government Code 8680.3 defines “disaster” as “a fire, flood, storm, tidal wave, earthquake, terrorism, epidemic, or other similar public calamity that the Governor determines presents a threat to public safety”;

WHEREAS, the Governor declared a State of Emergency throughout California related to the series of atmospheric river systems impacting California on January 4, 2023; and

WHEREAS, President Joe Biden through the Department of Homeland Security issued a Notice of Emergency Declaration on January 9, 2023 covering areas in the State of California and on January 11, 2023 issued Amendment No. 2 to the Notice to include Kings County; and

WHEREAS, the Governor again declared a State of Emergency on March 1, 2023, due to conditions of extreme peril to the safety of person and property due to the impacts of storms across California beginning late February 2023; and

WHEREAS, recent atmospheric river storms have brought significant amounts of runoff and flooding to Kings County, surrounding agricultural lands, and throughout California in a short period of time, causing an imminent threat of mass flooding and flood related disasters throughout Kings County, including City of Lemoore; and

WHEREAS, with the impending large amounts of snow accumulated in the Sierra Nevada Mountains and destined for the watersheds of the Kings River, the Kaweah River, the Tule River and Cross Creek, the City anticipates more flood releases from Pine Flat Dam, Terminus Dam and Success Dam and uncontrolled flood flows in Tule River, Dry Creek, Cross Creek and other local streams, on both the east and west sides of the Valley; and

WHEREAS, these conditions constitute an extreme peril to the health, safety and welfare of persons in Lemoore, and such conditions are beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of this City, therefore, necessitating this Proclamation of the existence of a local emergency; and

WHEREAS, City’s local resources are inadequate to respond to the imminent threat, and the resources of multiple political subdivisions of the State of California are required to respond to these conditions; and

WHEREAS, the Lemoore City Council is not in session, and cannot immediately be called into session.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY SERVICES OF THE CITY OF LEMOORE DOES HEREBY PROCLAIM:

The conditions of disaster and extreme peril to the safety of persons and property have arisen within the City of Lemoore and County of Kings caused by the large amounts of snow accumulated in the Sierra Nevada Mountains, precipitation from atmospheric river storms and imminent threat of flooding the City is experiencing as a result, and therefore, a local emergency now exists in the City of Lemoore.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY PROCLAIMED: By the City of Lemoore Director of Emergency Services that the State of California waive any regulations that may hinder response and recovery efforts and to make available recovery assistance under the California Disaster Assistance Act.

1. This Emergency Proclamation is issued pursuant to the Emergency Services Act, commencing with Government Code §8550.
2. This Proclamation shall be reviewed and ratified by the Lemoore City Council within 7 days, or it shall have no further force of effect. This Proclamation shall take effect immediately.

Proposed Motion:

Approve the agreement between the City of Lemoore and the Lemoore Volunteer Fire Department Association for ancillary services and authorize the City Manager, or designee, to execute the agreement.

Subject/Discussion:

The City and the Association negotiated an agreement for the City to pay the Association for ancillary services. The City will budget all other needs for fire services through the City’s budget, including equipment, waters and snacks for the volunteers providing fire services. The proposed agreement shall be effective from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. The contract outlines the services to be performed by the Lemoore Volunteer Fire Association, which includes:

- Organize, sponsor and implement participation at community activities and events, including but not limited to participation in the Holiday Parade and City Christmas Tree and Lighting.
- The Association shall propose and work with the City to create other mutually agreed upon events including, but not limited to festivals, celebrations, banquets, parades, and concerts.

- Provide, organize, and prepare for education opportunities in the community including, but not limited to, schools, churches, and other organizations.
- The Association shall work to find fire volunteers for the City to vet to become a City Volunteer Fire Fighter, following the Association By-Laws for making such recommendations with the City making the final decision in regard to the individual's capability.
- Provide the City a quarterly report describing its services for the quarter in detail.

In return for their ancillary services the city will provide a donation to the Association in the amount of \$78,000. As this agreement is between the City and Lemoore Volunteer Fire Association for the City to pay the Association for ancillary services,

Financial Consideration(s):

The Lemoore Volunteer Fire Department Association agreement is funded through the General Fund Fire Department budget (1000-835) and was included in the City Council approved budget for fiscal year 2024. The total donation amount is \$78,000.

Alternatives or Pros/Cons:

Pros:

- The contract allows for a more controlled budget and formalizes the method of compensation that satisfies both the City of Lemoore and Lemoore Volunteer Fire Department.
- Education services provided.
- City sponsorship of community events.

Cons:

- None noted.

**AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF LEMOORE
AND THE LEMOORE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT
ASSOCIATION FOR ANCILLARY SERVICES**

This Agreement is entered into between the City of Lemoore, a California municipal corporation and charter city (“City”), and the Lemoore Volunteer Fire Department Association, Inc., a California non-profit corporation (“Association”) with respect to the following recitals, which are a substantive part of this Agreement:

RECITALS

- A. The Association is a non-profit organization;
- B. Members of the Association volunteer to provide fire services to the City;
- B. The City desires to create community ties, promote fire education and safety, and build morale for its citizens; and
- C. The Association has the special knowledge and experience to assist in creating community ties, promote fire education and safety, and build morale for its citizens.

NOW THEREFORE, City and Association agree as follows:

- 1. Term. The term of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024, unless terminated sooner by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice. Any extension of this Agreement beyond fiscal year 2023-2024 shall require a new agreement.
- 2. Compensation. For performance of the services described in Section 3 of this Agreement, City shall pay to the Association seventy-eight thousand dollars **(\$78,000.00)**. For the 2023-2024 fiscal year, City shall pay to the Association a fee of seventy-eight thousand dollars (\$78,000.00), provided the programs and services anticipated by this Agreement have been carried out. The fee shall be prorated and paid within thirty (30) days following the end of a fiscal quarter, unless this Agreement is terminated sooner, in which case no further payments shall be made. Should this Agreement be terminated prior to June 30, 2024, Association funding shall be prorated to the date of termination and any excess funding received by the Association shall be returned to the City within thirty (30) days of termination.
- 3. Services. The Association shall provide the following services:
 - A. Events. Organize, sponsor and implement at community activities and events in the City during the term of this Agreement, specifically including, but not limited to, participation in the Holiday Parade and City Christmas Tree and Lighting. The Association shall propose and work with the City to create other mutually agreed upon events that include festivals, celebrations, banquets, parades, concerts or other mutually agreed upon activities, such as:

- (i) Bi-Annual Appreciation/ Awards Banquets
- (ii) Parades
- (iii) National Night Out
- (iv) Community Pancake Breakfast
- (v) Community Barbeque

B. Education. Provide, organize, and prepare for education opportunities in the community including, but not limited to, schools, churches, and other organizations. Responsibilities include community truck rides, station tours, fire education, and fire safety education. The Association will also provide any materials required for educating the public on fire safety.

C. Prescreening Fire Department Hires. The Association shall also work to find fire volunteers for the City to vet to become a City Volunteer Fire Fighter. The Association shall follow their By-laws for making such recommendations. However, the City will make the final decision with regard to an individual's ability to Volunteer as a City of Lemoore Fire Fighter if: (i) the Association disqualifies a candidate contrary to California or Federal Law and/or (ii) the City reasonably determines the candidate should be disqualified for liability purposes, including but not limited to, failed drug tests, or unable to pass a physical examination.

D. Quarterly Reports.

(i) Provide to the City a quarterly report describing in detail its services for the quarter. The report shall be submitted at least fifteen (15) days prior to the end of the fiscal quarter. The Association shall provide and coordinate their activities through the City Manager, or his designee.

4. Other Provisions.

A. Independent Contractor. It is understood and agreed that in the performance of this Agreement, the Association is an independent contractor. The Association shall be responsible for providing any additional insurance coverage necessary to perform the services under this agreement for anything not covered by the City's insurance and shall in all other respects comply with applicable provisions of Federal, State, and local laws, rules, and regulations. Association members are covered by City's insurance any time on city property or using a city vehicle.

B. Indemnification. The Association shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the City and its officers, agents, or employees from all claims for money, damages, or other relief arising in any way from the performance of this Agreement by the Association, its officers, agents, members, or employees.

C. Limitation On Use of Funds. The funds provided to the Association by the City pursuant to this Agreement shall not be directly or indirectly used for any political purpose whatsoever. This prohibition includes, but is not limited to, campaigns, events, promotions, literature, lobbying, or other activities for, against or on behalf of any state, local, or federal legislation, issue, candidate(s), or action, whether partisan in nature or not.

D. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the parties. There are no oral understandings, terms, or conditions, and neither party has relied upon any representation, express or implied, not contained herein. All prior understandings, terms, or conditions are deemed merged into this Agreement.

E. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is held to be void, voidable or unenforceable, the remaining portions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

F. Amendments. Any modification of this Agreement must be in writing and signed by both parties. No oral modifications shall be effective to vary or alter the terms of this Agreement.

G. Execution in Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts such that the signatures may appear on separate signature pages. A copy, or an original, with all signatures appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement. Signatures transmitted by facsimile shall be deemed original signatures.

H. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

I. Nondiscrimination. The Association certifies and agrees that all persons are and shall be treated equally without regard to or because of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, age, physical or mental disability, marital status, or political affiliation, in compliance with all applicable Federal and State anti-discrimination laws and regulations. The Association certifies and agrees that it, its affiliates, subsidiaries, or members shall comply with all applicable Federal and State laws and regulations to the end that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, age, physical or mental disability, marital status, or political affiliation, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under this Agreement or under any project, program, or activity supported by this Agreement. If the City finds that any provisions of this Section 4.I. have been violated, such violation shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement upon which the City may terminate or suspend this Agreement. While the City reserves the right to determine independently that the anti-discrimination provisions of this Agreement have been violated, in addition, a determination by the California Fair Employment and Housing Commission or the Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission that the Association has violated Federal or State anti-discrimination laws or regulations shall constitute a finding by the City that the Association has violated the anti-discrimination provisions of this Agreement.

J. Binding Effect. This Agreement is for the benefit of and shall be binding on all parties and their respective successors.

K. Authority. The parties represent and warrant that each has the full right, power, legal capacity and authority to enter into and perform their obligations under this Agreement and that no other approvals or consents of any other persons are necessary to make this Agreement enforceable.

L. Interpretation. The language of all parts of this Agreement shall, in all cases, be construed as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against either party.

Proposed Motion:

Approve the five-year lease agreements between the City of Lemoore, LYSL, and LYSA for the continued use of the Lemoore Youth Sports Park for games, league activities, tournaments and practices during specified days and times and authorize the City Manager, or designee, to execute the lease agreements on behalf of the City of Lemoore.

Subject/Discussion:

In 1995, the Lemoore Sports Complex came to fruition when members of Lemoore’s soccer and softball leagues met with City staff and City Council in order to lease the City owned property at 19th Ave and Cinnamon Dr. The Lemoore Youth Soccer Foundation (LYSF) began seeking volunteers from Lemoore and Kings County to create and construct the youth soccer and softball fields. Local businesses and the agricultural community volunteered time, money, equipment and administrative assistance.

The inaugural event occurred on August 23, 1997 when the Lemoore Soccer Festival opened the Lemoore Sports Complex. The creation of the facility was a community effort, started by concerned parents wanting their children to play soccer and softball on safe and well maintained athletic fields.

Financial Consideration(s):

Parks and Recreation will receive \$8,000 annually at minimum, plus a 5% inflator each year after that. The contract starts July of 2023 and ends June of 2028.

Alternatives or Pros/Cons:

Pros:

- The league will continue to have a location to hold their practices, events and tournaments.
- Parks and Recreation can hold youth sports and special events during the contracted days and times to bring more revenue into the city.
- The public will have access when the Complex is not rented.

Cons:

- None.

Commission/Board Recommendation:

Not applicable

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends that City Council approve the five-year lease agreements between the City of Lemoore and the LYSL and LYSA and granting the City Manager, or designee, the authority to execute the lease agreements on behalf of the City of Lemoore.

**LEASE AGREEMENT
BETWEEN THE CITY OF LEMOORE
AND
LEMOORE YOUTH SOCCER LEAGUE (LYSL)**

This LEASE AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 1st day of August, 2023 (“Effective Date”), by and between City of Lemoore, a Municipal Corporation (“City”), and Lemoore Youth Soccer League (“Association”). City and Association may be referred to hereinafter individually as a “Party” or collectively as the “Parties”.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, City is the owner of certain real property commonly known as the Lemoore Sportsplex and the Lemoore Sports Complex, which includes a parking lot, thirteen (13) soccer fields, a concession stand, and restroom facilities identified in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated by reference (“Field”); and

WHEREAS, the Parties agree that it is in their mutual interest and the interest of the community that the City leases the Field to the Association under the terms and conditions set forth herein.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the Parties hereto AGREE as follows:

1. **AGREEMENT TO LEASE.** Subject to the terms of this Agreement, City hereby leases the Field to the Association.
2. **TERM.** The term of this Agreement (“Term”) shall be for a period of five (5) years commencing on the Effective Date of this Agreement. Subject to City’s approval, this Agreement may be renewed after the expiration of the Term for one (1) successive period of five (5) years, subject to the terms and provisions of section 3, below. If Association elects to renew this Agreement, it shall provide City with written notice no later than ninety (90) days prior to expiration of the Term.
3. **FEES.**
 - a. As consideration for this Agreement, Association shall pay to the City the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the first year of this Agreement. Thereafter, the fee will be increased by five percent (5%) over the prior year’s fee. The first payment shall be due upon the Effective Date of this Agreement. Fees for subsequent years shall be due by the fifteenth (15th) day of July and may be paid in advance.
 - b. In the event Association renews this Agreement pursuant to section 2, above, fees

shall be subject to renegotiation.

4. USE.

- a. During regular league activities, beginning the first day of August and continuing through the second weekend in November, the Association shall have use of the Field on Mondays through Thursdays from 3:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 5:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m.
- b. Subject to City approval, District 7 league activities will be available to Association on Sundays with thirty (30) days written notice.
- c. Association and/or City, as mutually agreed, shall be responsible for activating and deactivating Field lights. Association shall be charged ten dollars (\$10.00) per hour per soccer field for light use outside of the prescribed times of use. Per hour pricing may be adjusted to comport with the City's Master User Fee Schedule.
- d. Association shall submit a schedule of proposed use for upcoming years by May 31st of the preceding year. The schedule of proposed use will be subject to the priority of usage in section 5 of this Agreement and may be adjusted monthly as the needs of the Parties dictate. City shall make all reasonable effort to limit the scheduling of activities during times when Association has primary use of the Field. City shall not schedule non-City public usage unless such can be accomplished in a manner so as not to unreasonably interfere with Association's use.
- e. Association shall provide adequate supervision and crowd control at all scheduled activities to ensure protection of Field. Adequacy of supervision and crowd control shall be determined by the City. An Association board member must be present at Field while games are in progress.
- f. Subject to availability and City's approval, Association shall have primary use of the Field for three (3) weekends per calendar year for tournament play or league activities, provided Association gives the City three (3) months advance written notice of the dates requested.
- g. The Field will only be scheduled as a youth sports, teen, special event or collegiate venue and City will not operate a Lemoore Parks and Recreation Youth Soccer Program so long as there is at least one established outdoor soccer league in the City of Lemoore.
- h. Association acknowledges that City and/or City authorized users shall be permitted to access and use the Field as reasonably necessary at all times, including times designated for Association use.
- i. City permits the Association to charge for parking or admission to the Field during those times when regular season or post season play are actively occurring. Association shall not collect parking or admission fees during times when City or

City organized public usage occurs concurrently with Association use.

- j. Association shall not use the Field for any other purpose(s) not directly connected with the operation of Association's soccer related activities.
 - k. City reserves the right to cancel any scheduled Association use due to adverse weather conditions that could endanger participants. Representatives from the City and Association will make reasonable efforts to meet prior to an event to assess the conditions of the Field and determine if cancellation or some other action is required. The final decision to cancel an event shall be made by the City's Community Services Manager or their designee.
 - l. Upon expiration and/or termination of this Agreement, Association shall return the Field to its original condition, allowing for reasonable and normal wear.
5. PRIORITY OF USAGE. Use of Field shall be provided based on the following priorities:
- a. Priority 1:
 - i. Facility lease agreements with organizations that have had consistent and historical use of the Field, including, but not limited to, the Lemoore Youth Softball Association and Lemoore Youth Soccer League; and
 - ii. City activities and programs.
 - b. Priority 2:
 - i. Lemoore resident, youth programs, youth non-profit organizations or youth leagues not associated with Association or the City.
 - c. Priority 3:
 - i. Other scheduled organized public usage, including but not limited to activities sponsored by civic and non-profit organizations or such activities as company picnics and/or family gatherings. Priority 3 rentals may include rentals outside of the City of Lemoore. No adult leagues or teams are permitted.
6. CONCESSION STAND.
- a. The Association is exclusively responsible for the operation of the concession stand and its contents, including, but not limited to, all concession stand equipment, appliances, utensils, and any other item necessary for operation.
 - b. All equipment, including, but not limited to, the ice machine, refrigerator, and concession items will be maintained and serviced by the Association, and

Association will be responsible for all repairs. City will not be responsible for any damage, service, maintenance and/or repair costs.

- c. The Association bears full responsibility for directing and controlling all volunteers and/or employees utilized during Association's concession stand operations.
 - d. Association shall be responsible for all direct utility costs associated with operating the concession stand.
 - e. Association shall comply with all applicable permits and requirements as set forth by the City, Kings County Health and Human Services Agency and any other applicable law or regulation.
 - f. City shall set forth minimum standards for all vendors performing, selling or providing products and services at the Field. Vendors and contractors shall name the City of Lemoore as an additional insured and proof of insurance must be provided to the City ten (10) days in advance of vendor's services.
7. RESTROOMS. During periods of scheduled use by Association, City shall be responsible for the toiletry supply and routine cleaning of restrooms. For purposes of this Agreement, routine cleaning shall consist of one (1) service on Monday and Friday of each week.
8. STORAGE. Association shall be allowed to maintain storage/maintenance areas, including storage containers (i.e., sea train containers) on the Field. The City is not responsible for any damage and/or theft to Association property while stored at the Field. City will not be responsible for any associated service, maintenance and/or repair costs. Association shall maintain its storage and/or maintenance areas in a manner acceptable to City.
9. ASSOCIATION MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR OF FIELD.
- a. Except for the items identified in section 10 of this Agreement, Association shall assume responsibility for all maintenance, damage, repair and upkeep of the Field during Association use.
 - b. Association shall notify City of any damage to the Field within forty-eight (48) hours of finding the damage. City shall determine, in its sole discretion, the Party responsible for repair of the damage or replacement of the damaged item and determine the manner in which repair or replacement is to be performed.
 - c. The Association shall be responsible for preparation of the playing fields (i.e., field lines, corner flags, goals, etc.) prior to games and may access the Field as reasonably necessary during the calendar year to perform maintenance related items or projects.

- d. Association shall remove all litter and other debris on or about the Field caused by the participants and spectators during Association's use of the Field. Association will be responsible for the cost of any additional dumpsters and must schedule additional dumpsters through the City's Utility Division.
- e. Association shall be responsible for any repair or maintenance required due to vandalism of and/or graffiti on Association equipment and structures. Graffiti removal shall be completed in accordance with the current City ordinance governing graffiti removal.

10. CITY MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR OF FIELD.

- a. City shall be responsible for regular maintenance of all fixed assets and grounds, including maintenance of the irrigation system, mowing, fertilizing, weed abatement, and gopher/rodent control.
- b. City shall be responsible for major structural repairs and/or capital improvements to the Field which are the subject of this Agreement. City shall have the sole discretion in determining what constitutes major structural and/or capital improvements.

11. ALTERATIONS TO THE FIELD. Except as otherwise provided in section 9 of this Agreement, Association shall make no alterations, improvements, or modifications to the Field without the prior written consent of City. Any such alterations, improvements or modifications to the Field shall become the sole and exclusive property of City upon completion of the alterations, improvements or modifications. If the City elects to require the Association to remove any alteration, improvements or modifications, Association shall do so and return the Field to its original condition, allowing for reasonable and normal wear.

12. SIGNAGE. Should Association desire to place signage on or about the Field, such signage and its location shall be subject to City's prior written approval, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. Association at its sole cost and expense shall also comply with all applicable laws related to such signage.

13. LIENS AND ENCUMBRANCES. At no cost to City, Association shall keep the Field free from any liens or encumbrances arising out of any work performed, materials furnished or obligations incurred by Association. Association shall promptly pay all claims for labor or materials furnished and indemnify City for any such claims which are alleged to have been furnished to or for Association at or for use in the Field, which claims are or may be secured by any mechanics' or materialmen's lien against the Field or any interest therein. City may record, post, and maintain notices of non-responsibility in and on the Field.

14. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS. Association shall not use, maintain, or keep any Hazardous

Materials, other than ordinary cleaning supplies and waste, on or in the Field without City's prior written approval. Association shall promptly give notice to City of any Hazardous Materials dispersal or spill, or Hazardous Materials claim, of which it is aware. Association shall indemnify and hold City harmless from any and all claims, costs, damages, penalties or liabilities arising out of Association's use or release of any Hazardous Materials at, in or on the Field. This provision does not apply to existing Hazardous Materials or Hazardous Materials which are introduced to the Field by City. The foregoing indemnification obligation shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement. The term "Hazardous Materials" as used in this Agreement shall mean any products, substances, chemical, material or waste whose presence, nature, quantity and/or intensity of existence, use, manufacture, disposal, transportation, spill, release or effect, either by itself or in combination with other materials expected to be on the premises, is either (a) potentially injurious to the public health, safety or welfare and environment of the premises, (b) regulated or monitored by any governmental authority, or (c) a basis for liability of City to any governmental agency or third party under any applicable statute or common law theory. Hazardous Materials shall include, but not be limited to, hydrocarbons, MTBE, petroleum, gasoline, crude oil, or any products, by-products, or fractions thereof.

15. TERMINATION. In addition to any other provision in this Agreement, this Agreement may be terminated upon the following:

- a. This Agreement shall terminate automatically if either party fails to remedy any breach of any term or condition of this Agreement within thirty (30) days after receiving written demand from the other Party to do so. If either Party is making good-faith efforts to eliminate any such breach or default, the period for correction shall be extended for such length of time as is reasonably necessary to remedy the breach.
- b. City may terminate this Agreement with or without cause upon sixty (60) days' prior written notice to the Association.

16. INSURANCE. At no cost to City, Association will procure and maintain the following insurance policies throughout the Term of this Agreement and name the City as additional insured.

- a. Comprehensive general liability insurance in an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence for each bodily injury, property damage, and personal injury arising out of Association's alleged or actual omission, act or negligence in the performance or failure to perform its obligations under this Agreement. The insurance will also include, but not be limited to, premises and operations liability, and independent contractors' liability.
- b. City, its officers, agents and employees, shall be named as additional insureds on

the above policies. The insurance carried by Association is primary to any insurance policies maintained by City, and no insurance held or owned by City will be called upon to contribute to a loss covered without reservation by Association's policies. Association's insurance policy will not be canceled or materially changed without first giving thirty (30) calendar days' prior written notice to City. Neither the existence of any of the insurance coverages required under this Agreement nor the minimum coverage limits specified herein with respect to any such coverage shall be deemed to limit or restrict in any way Association's indemnification obligations under this Agreement. Insurance coverages required under this Agreement shall be provided under either: (i) valid and enforceable policies issued by insurance companies legally authorized to do business in the State of California; or (ii) a program of self-insurance meeting all requirements of California law applicable to insurance coverage of that nature. Prior to accessing or using the Field, Association shall deliver to City properly executed certificates of insurance clearly evidencing all coverages, limits, and endorsements required above in this Agreement.

- c. If, at any time, Association employs any person(s), Association shall, at Association's sole cost and expense, keep or cause to be kept in force workers' compensation insurance with statutory limits and employer's liability insurance with limits of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per accident.

17. INDEMNIFICATION. Association agrees to indemnify, defend and hold City, its officers, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all actions, claims, damages, disabilities or expenses, including attorneys' fees and costs through trial and on appeal, that may be asserted by any person or entity, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, use of the Field during the Association's right to use the Field, or the tortious acts, errors, or omissions of a Party, its officers, agents, employees, participants, volunteers, and/or invitees, whether or not there is concurrent passive or active negligence on the part of such Party, but excluding liability to extent caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of the other Party. This indemnification obligation shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.
18. DISCRIMINATION. Association for itself, its personal representatives, successors in interest, and assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree that no person on the grounds of race, color, sex, disability, or national origin shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of Field.
19. ASSIGNMENT. This Agreement, the terms and conditions herein and rights and privileges herein are personal to Association and are not assignable without the prior written consent of City.
20. TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS. This Agreement may result in a taxable possessory interest and subject the Association to payment of property taxes. Association shall pay all taxes and assessments of any kind assessed or levied upon Association for the leased

premises by reason of this Agreement or of any improvements upon or in connection with this Agreement or the leased premises.

21. NO WAIVER. The failure by either Party to enforce any term or provision of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of that term or provision, or any other term or provision. No waiver by either Party of any term or provision of this Agreement shall be deemed or shall constitute a waiver of any other provision of this Agreement, nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver unless otherwise expressly provided in writing.
22. NOTICE. Any notice required or permitted to be given under the terms of this Agreement shall be mailed by certified mail, with return receipt requested, or personally delivered to the Party to whom such notice is required or permitted to be given hereunder. If mailed, any such notice shall be deemed to have been given three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail. If delivered personally, any such notice shall be deemed to have been given when received by the Party to whom notice is given. ***Any notice to City shall be addressed as follows:*** City of Lemoore Parks and Recreation Department, 711 West Cinnamon Drive, Lemoore, California 93245. ***Any notice to Association shall be addressed as follows:*** Lemoore Youth Soccer League, [ADDRESS]. Any change in the above addresses shall be promptly provided to the other Party.
23. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between and City and Association concerning the subject matter hereof. Any modification, waiver or amendment to this Agreement must be in writing signed by both Parties and approved by the governing body of each Party.
24. SEVERABILITY. In the event that one or more of the provisions of this Agreement shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Agreement, but this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision or provisions had never been contained herein.
25. TITLES AND HEADINGS. The titles and headings herein are for reference purposes only and shall not limit or define the meaning of the provisions of this Agreement nor shall they be used to interpret or construe the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
26. APPLICABLE LAW. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California. The state courts of the County of Kings shall be the exclusive venue for any litigation arising in any way from this Agreement.
27. COUNTERPARTS. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, and all of which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same Agreement. A copy, original or facsimile with all signatures appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement.
28. WARRANTY OF AUTHORITY. Each person below warrants and guarantees that s/he is

legally authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of the designated entity and that such execution shall bind the designated entity to the terms of this Agreement.

This LEASE AGREEMENT is made and entered into this 1st day of August 2023 (“Effective Date”), by and between City of Lemoore, a Municipal Corporation (“City”), and Lemoore Youth Softball Association (“Association”). City and Association may be referred to hereinafter individually as a “Party” or collectively as the “Parties”.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, City is the owner of certain real property commonly known as the Lemoore Sportsplex and the Lemoore Sports Complex, which includes a parking lot, six (6) softball fields, a concession stand, and restroom facilities identified in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated by reference (“Field”);

WHEREAS, the Parties agree that it is in their mutual interest and the interest of the community that the City leases the Field to the Association under the terms and conditions set forth herein;

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the Parties hereto AGREE as follows:

1. **AGREEMENT TO LEASE.** Subject to the terms of this Agreement, City hereby leases the Field to the Association.
2. **TERM.** The term of this Agreement (“Term”) shall be for a period of five (5) years commencing on the Effective Date of this Agreement. Subject to City’s approval, this Agreement may be renewed after the expiration of the Term for one (1) successive period of five (5) years, subject to the terms and provisions of section 3, below. If Association elects to renew this Agreement, it shall provide City with written notice no later than ninety (90) days prior to expiration of the Term.
3. **FEES.**
 - a. As consideration for this Agreement, Association shall pay to the City the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the first year of this Agreement. Thereafter, the fee will be increased by five percent (5%) over the prior year’s fee. The first payment shall be due upon the Effective Date of this Agreement. Fees for subsequent years shall be due by the fifteenth (15th) day of April and may be paid in advance.
 - b. In the event Association renews this Agreement pursuant to section 2, above, fees shall be subject to renegotiation.

4. USE.

- a. During regular league activities, beginning the first Saturday in February and continuing through the third weekend in May, the Association shall have use of the Field on Mondays through Fridays from 3:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 6:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m.
- b. City will allow the Association to schedule Association all-star practices with days and times submitted at the conclusion of the regular season provided thirty (30) days' written notice is provided. The Association shall have access to the Field and will limit use to one (1) softball diamond for each all-star team until the softball all-star season concludes.
- c. Association shall submit a schedule of proposed use for upcoming years by December 31st of the preceding year. The schedule of proposed use will be subject to the priority of usage in section 5 of this Agreement and may be adjusted monthly as the needs of the Parties dictate. City shall make all reasonable effort to limit the scheduling of non-Association activities during times when Association has primary use of the Field. City shall not schedule non-City public usage unless such can be accomplished in a manner so as not to unreasonably interfere with Association's use.
- d. Subject to availability and City's approval, Association shall have primary use of the Field the day before a tournament.
- e. Subject to availability and City's approval, Association shall have primary use of the Field for three (3) weekends per calendar year for tournament play or league activities, provided Association gives the City three (3) months advance written notice of the dates requested.
- f. Association shall provide adequate supervision and crowd control at all scheduled activities to ensure protection of Field. Adequacy of supervision and crowd control shall be determined by the City. An Association board member must be present at Field while games are in progress.
- g. The Field will only be scheduled as a youth sports, teen, special event or collegiate venue and City will not operate a Lemoore Parks and Recreation Youth Softball League so long as there is at least one established softball league in the City of Lemoore.
- h. Association acknowledges that City and/or City authorized users shall be permitted to access and use the Field as reasonably necessary at all times, including times designated for Association use.

- i. City permits the Association to charge for parking or admission to the Field during those times when regular season or post season play are actively occurring. Association shall not collect parking or admission fees during times when City or City organized public usage occurs concurrently with Association use.
 - j. Association shall not use the Field for any other purpose(s) not directly connected with the operation of Association's softball related activities.
 - k. City reserves the right to cancel any scheduled Association use due to adverse weather conditions that could endanger participants. Representatives from the City and Association will make reasonable efforts to meet prior to an event to assess the conditions of the Field and determine if cancellation or some other action is required. The final decision to cancel an event shall be made by the City's Community Services Manager or their designee.
 - l. Upon expiration and/or termination of this Agreement, Association shall return the Field to its original condition, allowing for reasonable and normal wear.
- 5. PRIORITY OF USAGE. Use of Field shall be provided based on the following priorities:
 - a. Priority 1:
 - i. Facility lease agreements with organizations that have had consistent and historical use of the Field, including, but not limited to, the Lemoore Youth Softball Association and Lemoore Youth Soccer League; and
 - ii. City activities and programs.
 - b. Priority 2:
 - i. Lemoore resident, youth programs, youth non-profit organizations or youth leagues not associated with Association or the City.
 - c. Priority 3:
 - i. Other scheduled organized public usage, including but not limited to activities sponsored by civic and non-profit organizations or such activities as company picnics and/or family gatherings. Priority 3 rentals may include rentals outside of the City of Lemoore. No adult leagues or teams are permitted.
- 6. CONCESSION STAND.
 - a. The Association is exclusively responsible for the operation of the concession stand and its contents, including, but not limited to, all concession stand equipment, appliances, utensils, and any other item necessary for operation.
 - b. All equipment, including, but not limited to, the ice machine, refrigerator, and

concession items will be maintained and serviced by the Association, and Association will be responsible for all repairs. City will not be responsible for any damage, service, maintenance and/or repair costs.

- c. The Association bears full responsibility for directing and controlling all volunteers and/or employees utilized during Association's concession stand operations.
 - d. Association shall be responsible for all direct utility costs associated with operating the concession stand.
 - e. Association shall comply with all applicable permits and requirements as set forth by the City, Kings County Health and Human Services Agency and any other applicable law or regulation.
 - f. City shall set forth minimum standards for all vendors performing, selling or providing products and services at the Field. Vendors and contractors shall name the City of Lemoore as an additional insured and proof of insurance must be provided to the City ten (10) days in advance of vendor's services.
7. RESTROOMS. During periods of scheduled use by Association, City shall be responsible for the toiletry supply and routine cleaning of restrooms. For purposes of this Agreement, routine cleaning shall consist of one (1) service on Monday and Friday of each week.
8. STORAGE. Association shall be allowed to maintain storage/maintenance areas, including storage containers (i.e., sea train containers) on the Field. The City is not responsible for any damage and/or theft to Association property while stored at the Field. City will not be responsible for any associated service, maintenance and/or repair costs. Association shall maintain its storage and/or maintenance areas in a manner acceptable to City.
9. ASSOCIATION MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR OF FIELD.
- a. Except for the items identified in section 10 of this Agreement, Association shall assume responsibility for all maintenance, damage, repair and upkeep of the Field during Association use.
 - b. Association shall notify City of any damage to the Field within forty-eight (48) hours of finding the damage. City shall determine, in its sole discretion, the Party responsible for repair of the damage or replacement of the damaged item and determine the manner in which repair or replacement is to be performed.
 - c. The Association shall be responsible for preparation of the playing fields (i.e., field lines, base lines, base placement) prior to games and may access the Field as reasonably necessary during the calendar year to perform maintenance related items

or projects.

- d. Association shall remove all litter and other debris on or about the Field caused by the participants and spectators during Association's use of the Field. Association will be responsible for the cost of any additional dumpsters and must schedule additional dumpsters through the City's Utility Division.
- e. Association shall be responsible for any repair or maintenance required due to vandalism of and/or graffiti on Association equipment and structures. Graffiti removal shall be completed in accordance with the current City ordinance governing graffiti removal.

10. CITY MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR OF FIELD.

- a. City shall be responsible for regular maintenance of all fixed assets and grounds, including maintenance of the irrigation system, mowing, fertilizing, weed abatement, and gopher/rodent control.
- b. City shall be responsible for major structural repairs and/or capital improvements to the Field which are the subject of this Agreement. City shall have the sole discretion in determining what constitutes major structural and/or capital improvements.

11. ALTERATIONS TO THE FIELD. Except as otherwise provided in section 9 of this Agreement, Association shall make no alterations, improvements, or modifications to the Field without the prior written consent of City. Any such alterations, improvements or modifications to the Field shall become the sole and exclusive property of City upon completion of the alterations, improvements or modifications. If the City elects to require the Association to remove any alteration, improvements or modifications, Association shall do so and return the Field to its original condition, allowing for reasonable and normal wear.

12. SIGNAGE. Should Association desire to place signage on or about the Field, such signage and its location shall be subject to City's prior written approval, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. Association at its sole cost and expense shall also comply with all applicable laws related to such signage.

13. LIENS AND ENCUMBRANCES. At no cost to City, Association shall keep the Field free from any liens or encumbrances arising out of any work performed, materials furnished or obligations incurred by Association. Association shall promptly pay all claims for labor or materials furnished and indemnify City for any such claims which are alleged to have been furnished to or for Association at or for use in the Field, which claims are or may be secured by any mechanics' or materialmen's lien against the Field or any interest therein. City may record, post, and maintain notices of non-responsibility in and on the Field.

14. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS. Association shall not use, maintain, or keep any Hazardous Materials, other than ordinary cleaning supplies and waste, on or in the Field without City's prior written approval. Association shall promptly give notice to City of any Hazardous Materials dispersal or spill, or Hazardous Materials claim, of which it is aware. Association shall indemnify and hold City harmless from any and all claims, costs, damages, penalties or liabilities arising out of Association's use or release of any Hazardous Materials at, in or on the Field. This provision does not apply to existing Hazardous Materials or Hazardous Materials which are introduced to the Field by City. The foregoing indemnification obligation shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement. The term "Hazardous Materials" as used in this Agreement shall mean any products, substances, chemical, material or waste whose presence, nature, quantity and/or intensity of existence, use, manufacture, disposal, transportation, spill, release or effect, either by itself or in combination with other materials expected to be on the premises, is either (a) potentially injurious to the public health, safety or welfare and environment of the premises, (b) regulated or monitored by any governmental authority, or (c) a basis for liability of City to any governmental agency or third party under any applicable statute or common law theory. Hazardous Materials shall include, but not be limited to, hydrocarbons, MTBE, petroleum, gasoline, crude oil, or any products, by-products, or fractions thereof.
15. TERMINATION. In addition to any other provision in this Agreement, this Agreement may be terminated upon the following:
- a. This Agreement shall terminate automatically if either party fails to remedy any breach or any term or condition of this Agreement within thirty (30) days after receiving written demand from the other Party to do so. If either Party is making good-faith efforts to eliminate any such breach or default, the period for correction shall be extended for such length of time as is reasonably necessary to remedy the breach.
 - b. City may terminate this Agreement with or without cause upon sixty (60) days' prior written notice to the Association.
16. INSURANCE. At no cost to City, Association will procure and maintain the following insurance policies throughout the Term of this Agreement and name the City as additional insured.
- a. Comprehensive general liability insurance in an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence for each bodily injury, property damage, and personal injury arising out of Association's alleged or actual omission, act or negligence in the performance or failure to perform its obligations under this Agreement. The insurance will also include, but not be limited to, premises and operations liability, and independent contractors' liability.
 - b. City, its officers, agents and employees, shall be named as additional insureds on the above policies. The insurance carried by Association is primary to any

insurance policies maintained by City, and no insurance held or owned by City will be called upon to contribute to a loss covered without reservation by Association's policies. Association's insurance policy will not be canceled or materially changed without first giving thirty (30) calendar days' prior written notice to City. Neither the existence of any of the insurance coverages required under this Agreement nor the minimum coverage limits specified herein with respect to any such coverage shall be deemed to limit or restrict in any way Association's indemnification obligations under this Agreement. Insurance coverages required under this Agreement shall be provided under either: (i) valid and enforceable policies issued by insurance companies legally authorized to do business in the State of California; or (ii) a program of self-insurance meeting all requirements of California law applicable to insurance coverage of that nature. Prior to accessing or using the Field, Association shall deliver to City properly executed certificates of insurance clearly evidencing all coverages, limits, and endorsements required above in this Agreement.

- c. If, at any time, Association employs any person(s), Association shall, at Association's sole cost and expense, keep or cause to be kept in force workers' compensation insurance with statutory limits and employer's liability insurance with limits of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per accident.
17. INDEMNIFICATION. Association agrees to indemnify, defend and hold City, its officers, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all actions, claims, damages, disabilities or expenses, including attorneys' fees and costs through trial and on appeal, that may be asserted by any person or entity, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, use of the Field during the Association's right to use the Field, or the tortious acts, errors, or omissions of a Party, its officers, agents, employees, participants, volunteers, and/or invitees, whether or not there is concurrent passive or active negligence on the part of such Party, but excluding liability to extent caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of the other Party. This indemnification obligation shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.
18. DISCRIMINATION. Association for itself, its personal representatives, successors in interest, and assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree that no person on the grounds of race, color, sex, disability, or national origin shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of Field.
19. ASSIGNMENT. This Agreement, the terms and conditions herein and rights and privileges herein are personal to Association and are not assignable without the prior written consent of City.
20. TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS. This Agreement may result in a taxable possessory interest and subject the Association to payment of property taxes. Association shall pay all taxes and assessments of any kind assessed or levied upon Association for the leased premises by reason of this Agreement or of any improvements upon or in connection with

this Agreement or the leased premises.

21. NO WAIVER. The failure by either Party to enforce any term or provision of this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of that term or provision, or any other term or provision. No waiver by either Party of any term or provision of this Agreement shall be deemed or shall constitute a waiver of any other provision of this Agreement, nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver unless otherwise expressly provided in writing.
22. NOTICE. Any notice required or permitted to be given under the terms of this Agreement shall be mailed by certified mail, with return receipt requested, or personally delivered to the Party to whom such notice is required or permitted to be given hereunder. If mailed, any such notice shall be deemed to have been given three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail. If delivered personally, any such notice shall be deemed to have been given when received by the Party to whom notice is given. ***Any notice to City shall be addressed as follows:*** City of Lemoore Parks and Recreation Department, 711 W. Cinnamon Drive, Lemoore, California 93245. ***Any notice to Association shall be addressed as follows:*** Lemoore Youth Softball Association, [ADDRESS]. Any change in the above addresses shall be promptly provided to the other Party.
23. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between and City and Association concerning the subject matter hereof. Any modification, waiver or amendment to this Agreement must be in writing signed by both Parties and approved by the governing body of each Party.
24. SEVERABILITY. In the event that one or more of the provisions of this Agreement shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Agreement, but this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision or provisions had never been contained herein.
25. TITLES AND HEADINGS. The titles and headings herein are for reference purposes only and shall not limit or define the meaning of the provisions of this Agreement nor shall they be used to interpret or construe the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
26. APPLICABLE LAW. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California. The state courts of the County of Kings shall be the exclusive venue for any litigation arising in any way from this Agreement.
27. COUNTERPARTS. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, and all of which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same Agreement. A copy, original or facsimile with all signatures appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement.
28. WARRANTY OF AUTHORITY. Each person below warrants and guarantees that s/he is legally authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of the designated entity and that

such execution shall bind the designated entity to the terms of this Agreement.

Proposed Motion:

Approval of second reading of Ordinance 2023-03, Amending Chapter 6, Title 3, Section 2 of the Lemoore Municipal Code pertaining to Speed Limits.

Subject/Discussion:

The Lemoore Police Department collected field data at forty-seven (47) locations shown in the attachment. This data is used to obtain the speeds at which cars travel in specified locations. It is recommended through the California Vehicle Code that speeds be set around the 85th percentile speed established through the engineering and traffic study. California Vehicle Code 22357 allows municipalities to make changes to speed limits over 25 miles per hour upon the basis of an engineering and traffic study. The change in ordinance would allow council to update speed limits by future approvals of the speed study and no longer require a new ordinance per speed study.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-03

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEMOORE AMENDING TITLE 6, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 2 OF THE LEMOORE MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO SPEED LIMITS

The City Council of the City of Lemoore does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 6-3-2A of the Lemoore Municipal Code is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

Speed limits in the zones should be established by the most recent speed study that has been approved and accepted by both Chief of Police as well as City Council.

A. SPEED LIMIT ZONES

Bush Street from Fox Street to Lemoore Avenue.
West Bush Street from 19th Avenue to 19 1/2 Avenue.
West Bush Street from 19th Avenue to Byron Street.
East D Street, 200 block east to 1/10 mile east of Smith Street.
West D Street from Olive Street to 19th Avenue.
West Hanford-Armona Road from Lemoore Avenue to Fox Street.
Lemoore Avenue from G Street to Hanford-Armona Road.
19th Avenue from Highway 198 to Cedar Lane.
Cinnamon Drive from Lemoore Avenue to Fox Street.
Iona Avenue from 18th Avenue to Vine Street.
Iona Avenue from Vine Street to 19th Avenue.
Cinnamon Drive from Carla Drive to Hanford-Armona Road.
Cinnamon Drive from 300 feet west of Venice Avenue to Lemoore Avenue.
19 1/2 Avenue from Bush Street to Cinnamon Drive.
19 1/2 Avenue from Sonoma Avenue to Bush Street.
Silverado Drive from 19th Avenue to Sonoma Avenue.

East Hanford-Armona Road from 100 yards east of Opal Avenue extended to Lemoore Avenue.
Lemoore Avenue from Hanford-Armona Road to Faun Lane.
Lemoore Avenue from Faun Lane to Glendale Avenue.
West D Street from 19th Avenue to West Bush Street.
Cinnamon Drive from Fox Street to 19th Avenue.
19th Avenue from Cedar Lane to Bush Street.
19th Avenue from West Bush Street to Cinnamon Drive.

SECTION 2. The City Council declares that each provision of this ordinance is severable and independent of every other provision. If any portion of this ordinance is held invalid, the City Council declares that it would have adopted the remaining provisions of this ordinance irrespective of the portion held invalid, and further declares its express intent that the remaining provisions of this ordinance should remain in effect after the invalid portion has been eliminated.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption and will not be codified in the City's Municipal Code.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk is hereby directed to cause a summary of this Ordinance to be published by one insertion in a newspaper of general circulation in the community at least five (5) days prior to adoption and again fifteen (15) days after its adoption. If a summary of the ordinance is published, then the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy of the full text of the proposed ordinance to be posted in the office of the City Clerk at least five (5) days prior to the Council meeting at which the ordinance is adopted, and again after the meeting at which the ordinance is adopted. The summary shall be approved by the City Attorney.

Proposed Motion:

Adoption of Ordinance 2023-04, Amending Chapter 7, Title 10, Section 2 of the Lemoore Municipal Code pertaining to the City Maintenance District.

Subject/Discussion:

Currently, the City of Lemoore utilizes Landscape and Lighting Maintenance Districts (LLMD) and Public Facilities Maintenance Districts (PFMD) throughout various parts of the City. LLMD's maintain lighting and landscaping throughout the district. This includes parkways, bike paths, and trails. PFMDs cover the same, but also include street maintenance. An annual tax assessment is taken for all residents in the zones to cover maintenance costs as approved annually by the Council.

The City of Lemoore is looking to change the services definition in Chapter 7, Title 10, section 2 of the Lemoore Municipal Code pertaining to the City Maintenance District. This update will allow the City of Lemoore to enter into a Community Facility District. This new district will allow the city to apply a special tax assessment to cover proportionate shares of public services such as the police department and fire department. These additional services and assessments will be in addition to the already established costs for Public Facilities Maintenance Districts.

Financial Consideration(s):

Community Facilities Districts will generate additional tax revenues for the City of Lemoore.

Alternatives or Pros/Cons:

Alternatives: Council could decline the change and prevent the city from entering into Community Facilities Districts for future developments.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-04

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEMOORE AMENDING SECTION TITLE 7, CHAPTER 10, SECTION 2 OF THE LEMOORE MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO CITY MAINTENANCE DISTRICT

The City Council of the City of Lemoore does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 7-10-2 of the Lemoore Municipal Code regarding services is hereby amended to read as follows:

For all purposes of interpreting and applying this chapter, the following terms shall have the following meanings, unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

DISTRICT: Any assessment district formed pursuant to this chapter.

IMPROVEMENT: Any one or combination of the following:

A. Any improvement described in section 22525 of the California Streets And Highways Code.

B. Any city street, highway, road, alley, lane, boulevard, pedestrian mall, parkway, bike path, trail or easement.

C. Any other governmental property or facilities which the city is authorized by law to finance, purchase, construct, expand, improve, rehabilitate, own, operate or contribute money to.

LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING ACT: The landscaping and lighting act of 1972 (the "act"), California Streets And Highways Code section 22500 et seq., as amended from time to time.

PROPOSITION 218: Article XIID of the California constitution.

SERVICES: Any or all of the following:

A. Maintaining, servicing, repairing, replacing, operating, caring for or preserving any "improvement" defined in this chapter, including but not limited to any of the following:

1. Maintaining, servicing, repairing, replacing, operating or caring for any street, highway, road, alley, lane, boulevard, pedestrian mall, parkway, bike path, trail, easement or other way dedicated to public use or used by the public, and all appurtenances and improvements therein, including, but not limited to, paving, surfaces, curbs, gutters, medians, street and traffic signs, other signage, streetlights, traffic signals, hydrants, sound walls, drains, tunnels, sewers, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, conduits, culverts, landscaping and hardscaping
2. Maintaining, servicing, repairing, replacing, operating, or caring for any landscaping, hardscaping, lighting, or signage next to any right of way or other way dedicated to

public use or used by the public and described in subsection A1 of this definition, or next to any canal, basin or ditch.

- B. Establishing and maintaining a reasonable reserve for repair and replacement under subsection A of this definition
- C. Districts may enter into a Community Facilities District allowing for a special tax assessment to assist in their proportionate share of public facilities and public safety costs. Public Safety can consist of but not limited to: fire, police, and ambulance.

SECTION 2. The City Council declares that each provision of this ordinance is severable and independent of every other provision. If any portion of this ordinance is held invalid, the City Council declares that it would have adopted the remaining provisions of this ordinance irrespective of the portion held invalid, and further declares its express intent that the remaining provisions of this ordinance should remain in effect after the invalid portion has been eliminated.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption and will not be codified in the City's Municipal Code.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk is hereby directed to cause a summary of this Ordinance to be published by one insertion in a newspaper of general circulation in the community at least five (5) days prior to adoption and again fifteen (15) days after its adoption. If a summary of the ordinance is published, then the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy of the full text of the proposed ordinance to be posted in the office of the City Clerk at least five (5) days prior to the Council meeting at which the ordinance is adopted, and again after the meeting at which the ordinance is adopted. The summary shall be approved by the City Attorney.

Proposed Motion:

Approval of the 2023 Speed Zone Study updating the Speed Limits in the City of Lemoore.

Subject/Discussion:

The Lemoore Police Department collected field data at forty-seven (47) locations shown in the attachment. This data is used to obtain the speeds at which cars travel in specified locations. It is recommended through the California Vehicle Code that speeds be set around the 85th percentile speed established through the engineering and traffic study. California Vehicle Code 22357 allows municipalities to make changes to speed limits over 25 miles per hour upon the basis of an engineering and traffic study. The change in ordinance would allow council to update speed limits by future approvals of the speed study and no longer require a new ordinance per speed study.

This memorandum outlines the engineering and traffic survey conducted at various locations throughout the City of Lemoore, California, in order to recommend appropriate speed zones for the studied roadways. Each location was divided into both directions of travel to ensure the street segments having unique characteristics were individually surveyed. This analysis and recommendations for speed zones followed the California Vehicle Code (CVC) requirements and the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (CA MUTCD).

Background

Chapter 7 of Division 11 of the CVC deals with speed laws. Per CVC Section 22357, whenever a local authority determines "... upon the basis of an engineering and traffic survey, that a speed greater than 25 miles per hour would facilitate the orderly movement of vehicular traffic and would be reasonable and safe... (it) ... may by ordinance determine and declare a prima facie speed limit of 30, 35, 40, 45, 50, 55, 60 miles per hour, or a maximum speed limit of 65 miles per hour, whichever is found most appropriate to facilitate the orderly movement of traffic and is reasonable and safe."

Data Collection and Analysis

Lemoore PD collected field data for the (47) locations shown on Attachment 2 on various dates between Tuesday, September 20, 2022 and Wednesday, October 12, 2022. Data for each zone was collected using a radar traffic speed meter. Data collected was recorded on the Vehicle Speed Survey Sheets that are attached. Each radar speed check was made by consultant personnel from an inconspicuously parked, unmarked vehicle. An effort was made to ensure that the vehicle's presence in no way affected the speed of the surveyed traffic.

The data includes the location of the speed survey, date and time, direction of traffic observed, number of lanes, paved roadway width, posted speed limit, weather, and whether the segment is in a business district, residential district, or school zone.

The lower body of the form consists of a summary table of various calculated parameters. An explanation of the data and terms follows:

- The assumed speed limit without an approved speed zone is given based on the segment lying within a business district, residential district, or school zone.
- The average speed is the total of all the vehicle speeds divided by the number of vehicles in the sample.
- The 10 MPH pace speed is the 10 miles per hour increment of observed speeds, which contains the greatest number of vehicles. In nearly all cases, the 85th-percentile speed and the recommended speed limit lie somewhere within the pace, frequently in the middle to upper ranges. This is an important indicator used to determine appropriate speed limits.

The number of vehicles within the pace is an indication of the bunching of vehicular speeds. Ideally, if all vehicles were traveling at or about the same speed, there would be a reduced likelihood of traffic collisions. In speed limit analysis, the higher the number (percentage) of vehicles within the pace, the better the speed distribution.

- The critical (85%) speed (or 85th-percentile speed) is that speed at or below which 85 percent of the observed vehicles are traveling. The 85th-percentile speed is the primary indicator of a speed limit that might be imposed subject to the secondary factors of collision experience and highway, traffic, and roadside conditions not readily apparent to the driver.

Per the CA MUTCD, a posted speed limit “**shall** be established at the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed of free-flowing traffic, except as shown in the two options below.”

Option

1. The posted speed may be reduced by 5 mph from the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed, in compliance with CVC Sections 627 and 22358.5.
2. For cases in which the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed would require rounding up, then the speed limit may be rounded down to the nearest 5 mph increment below the 85th-percentile speed, if no further reduction is used. Refer to CVC Section 21400(b).

Also, per the CA MUTCD, if the posted speed limit “has had the 5 mph reduction applied, then an engineering and traffic survey **shall** document in writing the conditions and justification for the lower speed limit and be approved by a registered Civil or Traffic Engineer.”

Results



Results of the speed study are attached in Attachment 1.

Collision Review

Per the CA MUTCD, the most recent two-year collision records should be reviewed when determining appropriate speed limits. Collision data was obtained from the California Highway Patrol's State-Wide Integrated Traffic Records System (SWITRS) for the years 2021 and 2022. During this two-year period, there were no collisions on the road segments surveyed resulting in fatalities. Therefore, a speed reduction based on collision history is not recommended for the roadway segments studied. See Attachment 3 for SWITRS Collision information.

Conclusion

Based on the speed data collected and a review of the collision history and conditions not readily apparent to the driver, the recommended speed limit for all 47 segments are shown in the attached spreadsheet (Attachment 1).

Proposed Motion:

Approval of the Vehicle Purchase and Sale Agreement between the City of Lemoore and California Rural Water Association Specialized Utilities Services (SUSP) and authorize the City Manager, or designee to execute the agreement and any related items.

Subject/Discussion:

In July of 2022 the City of Lemoore and SUSP entered into an agreement for water operations and management. Due to the high vehicle demand and difficulty of securing new vehicles, SUSP approached the City in purchasing the water division vehicles.

The City of Lemoore owns three (3) surplus Chevrolet trucks and two (2) surplus Ford trucks. Per Administrative Policy 2023-01, the City Manager may authorize disposition of surplus vehicles. Due to the outsourcing of the water division, the City has no current use for the vehicles and the City Manager has authorized the disposition of the vehicles.

Financial Consideration(s):

The purchase price for the five (5) vehicles is \$126,298.

2013 Chevrolet one-ton crane: \$35,000

2013 Ford one-ton crane: \$35,000

2019 Chevrolet three-quarter ton: \$29,560

2013 Ford F-150: \$6,746

2019 Chevrolet Colorado: \$19,995

Monthly payments in the amount of \$5,262.41 per month for twenty-four (24) months.

VEHICLE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT

This Vehicle Purchase and Sale Agreement (“Agreement”) is made and entered into on August 1, 2023 (“Effective Date”) between the City of Lemoore, a California municipal corporation (“Seller”), and the California Rural Water Association Specialized Utilities Services Program, a California non-profit organization (“Buyer”), with respect to the following Recitals, which are a substantive part of this Agreement. Seller and Buyer may individually be referred to herein as a “Party” and collectively referred to herein as the “Parties.”

RECITALS

- A. Seller owns three (3) surplus Chevrolet trucks and two (2) surplus Ford trucks, described on Schedule A, attached hereto and incorporated by reference. The vehicles listed on the attached Schedule A are hereinafter collectively referred to in this Agreement as the “Vehicles”.
- B. Seller has no current use for the Vehicles.
- C. Seller may dispose of personal property in any way it chooses if the disposition is for the common benefit.
- D. Pursuant to Seller’s Administrative Policy 2023-01, the City Manager may authorize the disposition of surplus vehicles.
- E. The City Manager has authorized the disposition of the Vehicles.
- F. Buyer is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and is the State of California’s leading association dedicated to providing on-site technical assistance and specialized training for rural water and wastewater systems.
- G. Seller desires to sell and Buyer desires to purchase the Vehicles.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows.

AGREEMENT

1. Purchase and Sale. Seller hereby sells the Vehicles, as described in Schedule A, to Buyer for the total purchase price of ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-SIX THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED NINETY-EIGHT DOLLARS (\$126,298.00) (“Purchase Price”). The Purchase Price is allocated as follows: \$35,000.00 for the 2013 Chevrolet one-ton crane, \$35,000.00 for the 2013 Ford one-ton crane, \$29,560.00 for the three-quarter ton Chevrolet, \$6,743.00 for the Ford F-150, and \$19,995.00 for the 2019 Chevrolet Colorado. Payment of the Purchase Price shall be made to Seller in twenty-four monthly payments of \$5,262.41 per month, due and payable the first day of the month, beginning September 2023 and ending September 2025.
2. Delivery of Vehicles and Transfer of Title. Seller shall convey to Buyer good and marketable title to the Vehicles, free and clear of all liens and encumbrances, except as otherwise expressly provided in this Agreement within thirty (30) days following final payment in September 2025.

Delivery of the Vehicles from Seller to Buyer shall take place within five (5) days of both Parties execution of this Agreement. Said delivery of the Vehicles shall be at a time and place mutually agreed upon by the Parties. This Agreement shall serve as a bill of sale conveying the Vehicles to Buyer, and Seller and Buyer shall complete and exchange any paperwork required by the State of California to register the vehicles in the name of Buyer, evidence Seller as a lien holder, and transfer title to the vehicles after final payment.

3. Condition of Vehicles.

a. Representations. Seller represents to Buyer that Seller is the legal and beneficial owner of the Vehicles and has the right and authority to sell them, and that Seller has not entered into any agreements or commitments that would prevent it from conveying the Vehicles to Buyer as contemplated by this Agreement. Seller further represents to Buyer that, to Seller's knowledge, without any duty to further investigate, the Vehicle is in good working order and Seller is unaware of any latent defects to the Vehicles.

b. Inspection. Except as provided in Section 3(a), Buyer has had an opportunity to inspect the Vehicles and acknowledges that it is purchasing the Vehicles “as is,” “where is,” and “with all faults.”

If any repairs, modifications, or upgrades (“Repairs”) to the Vehicles are required for Buyer’s intended use, all Repairs shall be at Buyer’s sole cost and expense. Buyer may not rely upon any verbal representations from Seller, or any official or employee of Seller, regarding condition of the Vehicles.

Except as provided in Section 3(a), Buyer accepts the Vehicles in its present condition, and Seller makes no representations or warranties, express or implied, with respect to the condition or fitness of the Vehicles for any particular purpose or intended use.

THERE ARE NO EXPRESS OR IMPLIED WARRANTIES WITH RESPECT TO MERCHANTABILITY, SUITABILITY, FITNESS FOR PURPOSE, OR OTHERWISE CONCERNING THE VEHICLES, PARTS, OR ACCESSORIES THEREON.

4. Risk of Loss. The risk of loss or damage to the Vehicles shall remain with Seller until delivery of the Vehicles to Buyer as provided in Section 2, at which time the risk of loss or damage shall pass to Buyer.

5. Indemnification. Buyer shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Seller from and against any and all claims, losses, damages, liabilities, costs, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys’ fees) arising out of or in connection with the use or operation of the Vehicles by Buyer or its agents, employees, or contractors after the delivery of the Vehicles to Buyer as provided in Section 2, or any breach of this Agreement by Buyer. Conversely, Seller shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Buyer from and against any and all claims, losses, damages, liabilities, costs, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys’ fees) arising out of or in connection with the use or operation of the Vehicles by Seller or its agents, employees, or contractors prior the delivery of the Vehicles to Buyer, as provided in Section 2, any breach of this Agreement by Seller, or any breach by Seller of the representations described in Section 3(a).

6. Insurance. Buyer shall insure the Vehicles, naming the Seller as additional insured, until the final payment is made as described in Section 1 and transfer of title from Seller to Buyer is complete

as described in Section 2. Buyer shall have sole responsibility for the cost of the insurance. Buyer shall obtain and maintain in full force and effect, automobile liability coverage in the amount no less than \$[AMOUNT] per person and \$[AMOUNT] per accident, for bodily injury and property damage. Buyer must provide Seller proof of coverage annually upon each renewal as well as notice of cancellation.

6. Governing Law; Venue. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. In the event of any dispute arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, venue shall be with the appropriate state or federal court serving Kings County.

7. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior negotiations, understandings, and agreements between the Parties, whether written or oral, relating to the subject matter hereof.

8. Counterparts; Digital Signature. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, all of which, taken together, shall constitute the same instrument. A copy, original or facsimile with all signatures appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement. A digital signature meeting the requirements of California Government Code section 16.5 shall also constitute an original signature for purposes of execution.

9. Binding Effect. This Agreement is binding upon the heirs, successors, and assigns of the Parties.

10. No Assignment Without Written Consent. This Agreement may not be assigned by the Seller except with the express written consent of Buyer.

11. Partial Invalidity; Severability. If any term or provision of this Agreement shall, to any extent, be held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining terms and provisions of the Agreement shall continue in effect.

12. Amendments. This Agreement may only be amended, modified, changed, or supplemented by a written instrument signed by both Parties.

13. Interpretation. The language of all parts of this Agreement shall, in all cases, be construed as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against either Party.

14. Authority to Execute. Each person executing this Agreement warrants that the Agreement has been duly authorized and approved by their respective governing body, that he or she is legally authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of the designated entity, and that such execution shall bind the entity to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

15. Notices. Any notice, request, demand, or other communication required or permitted to be made under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be delivered personally, by facsimile, electronic mail, or by a nationally recognized overnight courier service which provides written proof of delivery (such as UPS or Federal Express). Any such notice shall be deemed given when so delivered personally, or if delivered by facsimile or electronic mail shall be effective upon confirmation of receipt, and any notice sent by a nationally recognized overnight courier shall be effective on the date of delivery to the Party at its address specified below as set forth in the courier's delivery receipt.

Either Party may, by notice to the other from time to time in the manner herein provided, specify a different address for notice purposes.

16. Waiver. Waiver by either Party of any breach by the other Party of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed an ongoing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same provision or a waiver of a breach of any other provision of this Agreement.

17. Transfer Taxes. To the extent that any sales, use, value-added, gross receipts, excise, registration, stamp duty, transfer or other similar taxes or governmental fees (including any interest or penalties related thereto) are incurred in connection with the sale or purchase of the Vehicles ("Transfer Taxes"), Buyer shall be responsible for and shall pay such Transfer Taxes when due. To the extent that a Party is required by law to file a Tax Return with respect to such Transfer Taxes, such Party shall do so within the period prescribed by law. To the extent that Seller provides Buyer with evidence that it was required by law to pay any such Transfer Taxes, and has in fact paid such Transfer Taxes, Buyer shall promptly reimburse the Seller for payment of any such Transfer Taxes.

Proposed Motion:

Approve the budget amendment for the new 2024 Ferrara Type 1 Pumper Engine in the amount of \$358,000.00.

Subject/Discussion:

In 2022, Lemoore Volunteer Fire Department received award notification for \$2,000,000 (2 million dollars) funding from Senator Hurtado's office. Purchases for equipment and vehicles were approved at the July 18, 2023 City Council meeting.

The 2024 Ferrara Type 1 Pumper Engine was quoted at \$639,996.50 in March of 2023 and was approved in the FY 2023-2024 budget. Due to inflation and as well as adding the \$170,000.00 to fully equip the truck, a budget amendment in the amount of \$358,000 from the SB178 Funding to the Fire Department fund is needed for the difference. The total price for the 2024 Ferrara Type 1 Pumper engine is \$997,785.36.

Financial Consideration(s):

The purchases of equipment and vehicles are funded through the SB178 \$2,000,000 Grant received by the Lemoore Volunteer Fire Department.

The 2024 Ferrara Type 1 Pumper Engine is \$997,785.36 and will be replacing Truck #6 from our fleet. Original request was for \$639,996.50. An additional \$358,000 is needed to cover the entire cost of the vehicle.

- Replace aging equipment for more efficient and effective emergency response
- Fully reimbursed through the SB 178 Funding

This Contract is between Sourcewell, 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 (Sourcewell) and Rev Group, Inc., 245 S. Executive Dr., Suite 100, Brookfield, WI 53005 (Supplier).

Sourcewell is a State of Minnesota local government unit and service cooperative created under the laws of the State of Minnesota (Minnesota Statutes Section 123A.21) that offers cooperative procurement solutions to government entities. Participation is open to eligible federal, state/province, and municipal governmental entities, higher education, K-12 education, nonprofit, tribal government, and other public entities located in the United States and Canada. Sourcewell issued a public solicitation for Firefighting Apparatus and Fire Service Vehicles from which Supplier was awarded a contract.

Supplier desires to contract with Sourcewell to provide equipment, products, or services to Sourcewell and the entities that access Sourcewell's cooperative purchasing contracts (Participating Entities).

1. TERM OF CONTRACT

- A. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Contract is effective upon the date of the final signature below.
- B. **EXPIRATION DATE AND EXTENSION.** This Contract expires February 10, 2026, unless it is cancelled sooner pursuant to Article 22. This Contract may be extended one additional year upon the request of Sourcewell and written agreement by Supplier.
- C. **SURVIVAL OF TERMS.** Notwithstanding any expiration or termination of this Contract, all payment obligations incurred prior to expiration or termination will survive, as will the following: Articles 11 through 14 survive the expiration or cancellation of this Contract. All other rights will cease upon expiration or termination of this Contract.

2. EQUIPMENT, PRODUCTS, OR SERVICES

- A. **EQUIPMENT, PRODUCTS, OR SERVICES.** Supplier will provide the Equipment, Products, or Services as stated in its Proposal submitted under the Solicitation Number listed above.

Supplier's Equipment, Products, or Services Proposal (Proposal) is attached and incorporated into this Contract.

All Equipment and Products provided under this Contract must be new and the current model. Supplier may offer close-out, refurbished, or remounted Equipment or Products if they are clearly indicated in Supplier's product and pricing list. Unless agreed to by the Participating Entities in advance, Equipment or Products must be delivered as operational to the Participating Entity's site.

This Contract offers an indefinite quantity of sales, and while substantial volume is anticipated, sales and sales volume are not guaranteed.

B. **WARRANTY.** Supplier warrants that all Equipment, Products, and Services furnished are free from liens and encumbrances, and are free from defects in design, materials, and workmanship. In addition, Supplier warrants the Equipment, Products, and Services are suitable for and will perform in accordance with the ordinary use for which they are intended. Supplier's dealers and distributors must agree to assist the Participating Entity in reaching a resolution in any dispute over warranty terms with the manufacturer. Any manufacturer's warranty that extends beyond the expiration of the Supplier's warranty will be passed on to the Participating Entity.

C. **DEALERS, DISTRIBUTORS, AND/OR RESELLERS.** Upon Contract execution and throughout the Contract term, Supplier must provide to Sourcewell a current means to validate or authenticate Supplier's authorized dealers, distributors, or resellers relative to the Equipment, Products, and Services offered under this Contract, which will be incorporated into this Contract by reference. It is the Supplier's responsibility to ensure Sourcewell receives the most current information.

3. PRICING

All Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract will be priced at or below the price stated in Supplier's Proposal.

When providing pricing quotes to Participating Entities, all pricing quoted must reflect a Participating Entity's total cost of acquisition. This means that the quoted cost is for delivered Equipment, Products, and Services that are operational for their intended purpose, and includes all costs to the Participating Entity's requested delivery location.

Regardless of the payment method chosen by the Participating Entity, the total cost associated with any purchase option of the Equipment, Products, or Services must always be disclosed in the pricing quote to the applicable Participating Entity at the time of purchase.

A. **SHIPPING AND SHIPPING COSTS.** All delivered Equipment and Products must be properly packaged. Damaged Equipment and Products may be rejected. If the damage is not readily

apparent at the time of delivery, Supplier must permit the Equipment and Products to be returned within a reasonable time at no cost to Sourcewell or its Participating Entities. Participating Entities reserve the right to inspect the Equipment and Products at a reasonable time after delivery where circumstances or conditions prevent effective inspection of the Equipment and Products at the time of delivery. In the event of the delivery of nonconforming Equipment and Products, the Participating Entity will notify the Supplier as soon as possible and the Supplier will replace nonconforming Equipment and Products with conforming Equipment and Products that are acceptable to the Participating Entity.

Supplier must arrange for and pay for the return shipment on Equipment and Products that arrive in a defective or inoperable condition.

Sourcewell may declare the Supplier in breach of this Contract if the Supplier intentionally delivers substandard or inferior Equipment or Products.

B. SALES TAX. Each Participating Entity is responsible for supplying the Supplier with valid tax-exemption certification(s). When ordering, a Participating Entity must indicate if it is a tax-exempt entity.

C. HOT LIST PRICING. At any time during this Contract, Supplier may offer a specific selection of Equipment, Products, or Services at discounts greater than those listed in the Contract. When Supplier determines it will offer Hot List Pricing, it must be submitted electronically to Sourcewell in a line-item format. Equipment, Products, or Services may be added or removed from the Hot List at any time through a Sourcewell Price and Product Change Form as defined in Article 4 below.

Hot List program and pricing may also be used to discount and liquidate close-out and discontinued Equipment and Products as long as those close-out and discontinued items are clearly identified as such. Current ordering process and administrative fees apply. Hot List Pricing must be published and made available to all Participating Entities.

4. PRODUCT AND PRICING CHANGE REQUESTS

Supplier may request Equipment, Product, or Service changes, additions, or deletions at any time. All requests must be made in writing by submitting a signed Sourcewell Price and Product Change Request Form to the assigned Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator. This approved form is available from the assigned Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator. At a minimum, the request must:

- Identify the applicable Sourcewell contract number;
- Clearly specify the requested change;
- Provide sufficient detail to justify the requested change;

- Individually list all Equipment, Products, or Services affected by the requested change, along with the requested change (e.g., addition, deletion, price change); and
- Include a complete restatement of pricing documentation in Microsoft Excel with the effective date of the modified pricing, or product addition or deletion. The new pricing restatement must include all Equipment, Products, and Services offered, even for those items where pricing remains unchanged.

A fully executed Sourcwell Price and Product Change Request Form will become an amendment to this Contract and will be incorporated by reference.

5. PARTICIPATION, CONTRACT ACCESS, AND PARTICIPATING ENTITY REQUIREMENTS

A. PARTICIPATION. Sourcwell's cooperative contracts are available and open to public and nonprofit entities across the United States and Canada; such as federal, state/province, municipal, K-12 and higher education, tribal government, and other public entities.

The benefits of this Contract should be available to all Participating Entities that can legally access the Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract. A Participating Entity's authority to access this Contract is determined through its cooperative purchasing, interlocal, or joint powers laws. Any entity accessing benefits of this Contract will be considered a Service Member of Sourcwell during such time of access. Supplier understands that a Participating Entity's use of this Contract is at the Participating Entity's sole convenience and Participating Entities reserve the right to obtain like Equipment, Products, or Services from any other source.

Supplier is responsible for familiarizing its sales and service forces with Sourcwell contract use eligibility requirements and documentation and will encourage potential participating entities to join Sourcwell. Sourcwell reserves the right to add and remove Participating Entities to its roster during the term of this Contract.

B. PUBLIC FACILITIES. Supplier's employees may be required to perform work at government-owned facilities, including schools. Supplier's employees and agents must conduct themselves in a professional manner while on the premises, and in accordance with Participating Entity policies and procedures, and all applicable laws.

6. PARTICIPATING ENTITY USE AND PURCHASING

A. ORDERS AND PAYMENT. To access the contracted Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract, a Participating Entity must clearly indicate to Supplier that it intends to access this Contract; however, order flow and procedure will be developed jointly between Sourcwell and Supplier. Typically, a Participating Entity will issue an order directly to Supplier or its authorized subsidiary, distributor, dealer, or reseller. If a Participating Entity issues a purchase order, it may use its own forms, but the purchase order should clearly note the applicable Sourcwell

contract number. All Participating Entity orders under this Contract must be issued prior to expiration or cancellation of this Contract; however, Supplier performance, Participating Entity payment obligations, and any applicable warranty periods or other Supplier or Participating Entity obligations may extend beyond the term of this Contract.

Supplier's acceptable forms of payment are included in its attached Proposal. Participating Entities will be solely responsible for payment and Sourcewell will have no liability for any unpaid invoice of any Participating Entity.

B. **ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS/PARTICIPATING ADDENDUM.** Additional terms and conditions to a purchase order, or other required transaction documentation, may be negotiated between a Participating Entity and Supplier, such as job or industry-specific requirements, legal requirements (e.g., affirmative action or immigration status requirements), or specific local policy requirements. Some Participating Entities may require the use of a Participating Addendum; the terms of which will be negotiated directly between the Participating Entity and the Supplier. Any negotiated additional terms and conditions must never be less favorable to the Participating Entity than what is contained in this Contract.

C. **SPECIALIZED SERVICE REQUIREMENTS.** In the event that the Participating Entity requires service or specialized performance requirements not addressed in this Contract (such as e-commerce specifications, specialized delivery requirements, or other specifications and requirements), the Participating Entity and the Supplier may enter into a separate, standalone agreement, apart from this Contract. Sourcewell, including its agents and employees, will not be made a party to a claim for breach of such agreement.

D. **TERMINATION OF ORDERS.** Participating Entities may terminate an order, in whole or in part, immediately upon notice to Supplier in the event of any of the following events:

1. The Participating Entity fails to receive funding or appropriation from its governing body at levels sufficient to pay for the equipment, products, or services to be purchased; or
2. Federal, state, or provincial laws or regulations prohibit the purchase or change the Participating Entity's requirements.

E. **GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE.** The governing law and venue for any action related to a Participating Entity's order will be determined by the Participating Entity making the purchase.

7. CUSTOMER SERVICE

A. **PRIMARY ACCOUNT REPRESENTATIVE.** Supplier will assign an Account Representative to Sourcewell for this Contract and must provide prompt notice to Sourcewell if that person is changed. The Account Representative will be responsible for:

- Maintenance and management of this Contract;
- Timely response to all Sourcwell and Participating Entity inquiries; and
- Business reviews to Sourcwell and Participating Entities, if applicable.

B. BUSINESS REVIEWS. Supplier must perform a minimum of one business review with Sourcwell per contract year. The business review will cover sales to Participating Entities, pricing and contract terms, administrative fees, sales data reports, supply issues, customer issues, and any other necessary information.

8. REPORT ON CONTRACT SALES ACTIVITY AND ADMINISTRATIVE FEE PAYMENT

A. CONTRACT SALES ACTIVITY REPORT. Each calendar quarter, Supplier must provide a contract sales activity report (Report) to the Sourcwell Supplier Development Administrator assigned to this Contract. Reports are due no later than 45 days after the end of each calendar quarter. A Report must be provided regardless of the number or amount of sales during that quarter (i.e., if there are no sales, Supplier must submit a report indicating no sales were made).

The Report must contain the following fields:

- Participating Entity Name (e.g., City of Staples Highway Department);
- Participating Entity Physical Street Address;
- Participating Entity City;
- Participating Entity State/Province;
- Participating Entity Zip/Postal Code;
- Participating Entity Contact Name;
- Participating Entity Contact Email Address;
- Participating Entity Contact Telephone Number;
- Sourcwell Assigned Entity/Participating Entity Number;
- Item Purchased Description;
- Item Purchased Price;
- Sourcwell Administrative Fee Applied; and
- Date Purchase was invoiced/sale was recognized as revenue by Supplier.

B. ADMINISTRATIVE FEE. In consideration for the support and services provided by Sourcwell, the Supplier will pay an administrative fee to Sourcwell on all Equipment, Products, and Services provided to Participating Entities. The Administrative Fee must be included in, and not added to, the pricing. Supplier may not charge Participating Entities more than the contracted price to offset the Administrative Fee.

The Supplier will submit payment to Sourcwell for the percentage of administrative fee stated in the Proposal multiplied by the total sales of all Equipment, Products, and Services purchased

by Participating Entities under this Contract during each calendar quarter. Payments should note the Supplier's name and Sourcewell-assigned contract number in the memo; and must be mailed to the address above "Attn: Accounts Receivable" or remitted electronically to Sourcewell's banking institution per Sourcewell's Finance department instructions. Payments must be received no later than 45 calendar days after the end of each calendar quarter.

Supplier agrees to cooperate with Sourcewell in auditing transactions under this Contract to ensure that the administrative fee is paid on all items purchased under this Contract.

In the event the Supplier is delinquent in any undisputed administrative fees, Sourcewell reserves the right to cancel this Contract and reject any proposal submitted by the Supplier in any subsequent solicitation. In the event this Contract is cancelled by either party prior to the Contract's expiration date, the administrative fee payment will be due no more than 30 days from the cancellation date.

9. AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE

Sourcewell's Authorized Representative is its Chief Procurement Officer.

Supplier's Authorized Representative is the person named in the Supplier's Proposal. If Supplier's Authorized Representative changes at any time during this Contract, Supplier must promptly notify Sourcewell in writing.

10. AUDIT, ASSIGNMENT, AMENDMENTS, WAIVER, AND CONTRACT COMPLETE

A. **AUDIT.** Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 16C.05, subdivision 5, the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant to this Agreement are subject to examination by Sourcewell or the Minnesota State Auditor for a minimum of six years from the end of this Contract. This clause extends to Participating Entities as it relates to business conducted by that Participating Entity under this Contract.

B. **ASSIGNMENT.** Neither party may assign or otherwise transfer its rights or obligations under this Contract without the prior written consent of the other party and a fully executed assignment agreement. Such consent will not be unreasonably withheld. Any prohibited assignment will be invalid.

C. **AMENDMENTS.** Any amendment to this Contract must be in writing and will not be effective until it has been duly executed by the parties.

D. **WAIVER.** Failure by either party to take action or assert any right under this Contract will not be deemed a waiver of such right in the event of the continuation or repetition of the circumstances giving rise to such right. Any such waiver must be in writing and signed by the parties.

E. **CONTRACT COMPLETE.** This Contract represents the complete agreement between the parties. No other understanding regarding this Contract, whether written or oral, may be used to bind either party. For any conflict between the attached Proposal and the terms set out in Articles 1-22 of this Contract, the terms of Articles 1-22 will govern.

F. **RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES.** The relationship of the parties is one of independent contractors, each free to exercise judgment and discretion with regard to the conduct of their respective businesses. This Contract does not create a partnership, joint venture, or any other relationship such as master-servant, or principal-agent.

11. INDEMNITY AND HOLD HARMLESS

Supplier must indemnify, defend, save, and hold Sourcewell and its Participating Entities, including their agents and employees, harmless from any claims or causes of action, including attorneys' fees incurred by Sourcewell or its Participating Entities, arising out of any act or omission in the performance of this Contract by the Supplier or its agents or employees; this indemnification includes injury or death to person(s) or property alleged to have been caused by some defect in the Equipment, Products, or Services under this Contract to the extent the Equipment, Product, or Service has been used according to its specifications. Sourcewell's responsibility will be governed by the State of Minnesota's Tort Liability Act (Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466) and other applicable law.

12. GOVERNMENT DATA PRACTICES

Supplier and Sourcewell must comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13, as it applies to all data provided by or provided to Sourcewell under this Contract and as it applies to all data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by the Supplier under this Contract.

13. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY, PUBLICITY, MARKETING, AND ENDORSEMENT

A. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

1. *Grant of License.* During the term of this Contract:

- a. Sourcewell grants to Supplier a royalty-free, worldwide, non-exclusive right and license to use the trademark(s) provided to Supplier by Sourcewell in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing Sourcewell's relationship with Supplier.
- b. Supplier grants to Sourcewell a royalty-free, worldwide, non-exclusive right and license to use Supplier's trademarks in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing Supplier's relationship with Sourcewell.

2. *Limited Right of Sublicense.* The right and license granted herein includes a limited right of each party to grant sublicenses to their respective subsidiaries, distributors, dealers,

resellers, marketing representatives, and agents (collectively "Permitted Sublicensees") in advertising and promotional materials for the purpose of marketing the Parties' relationship to Participating Entities. Any sublicense granted will be subject to the terms and conditions of this Article. Each party will be responsible for any breach of this Article by any of their respective sublicensees.

3. Use; Quality Control.

a. Neither party may alter the other party's trademarks from the form provided and must comply with removal requests as to specific uses of its trademarks or logos.

b. Each party agrees to use, and to cause its Permitted Sublicensees to use, the other party's trademarks only in good faith and in a dignified manner consistent with such party's use of the trademarks. Upon written notice to the breaching party, the breaching party has 30 days of the date of the written notice to cure the breach or the license will be terminated.

4. As applicable, Supplier agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Sourcewell and its Participating Entities against any and all suits, claims, judgments, and costs instituted or recovered against Sourcewell or Participating Entities by any person on account of the use of any Equipment or Products by Sourcewell or its Participating Entities supplied by Supplier in violation of applicable patent or copyright laws.

5. **Termination.** Upon the termination of this Contract for any reason, each party, including Permitted Sublicensees, will have 30 days to remove all Trademarks from signage, websites, and the like bearing the other party's name or logo (excepting Sourcewell's pre-printed catalog of suppliers which may be used until the next printing). Supplier must return all marketing and promotional materials, including signage, provided by Sourcewell, or dispose of it according to Sourcewell's written directions.

B. **PUBLICITY.** Any publicity regarding the subject matter of this Contract must not be released without prior written approval from the Authorized Representatives. Publicity includes notices, informational pamphlets, press releases, research, reports, signs, and similar public notices prepared by or for the Supplier individually or jointly with others, or any subcontractors, with respect to the program, publications, or services provided resulting from this Contract.

C. **MARKETING.** Any direct advertising, marketing, or offers with Participating Entities must be approved by Sourcewell. Send all approval requests to the Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator assigned to this Contract.

D. **ENDORSEMENT.** The Supplier must not claim that Sourcewell endorses its Equipment, Products, or Services.

14. GOVERNING LAW, JURISDICTION, AND VENUE

The substantive and procedural laws of the State of Minnesota will govern this Contract. Venue for all legal proceedings arising out of this Contract, or its breach, must be in the appropriate state court in Todd County, Minnesota or federal court in Fergus Falls, Minnesota.

15. FORCE MAJEURE

Neither party to this Contract will be held responsible for delay or default caused by acts of God or other conditions that are beyond that party's reasonable control. A party defaulting under this provision must provide the other party prompt written notice of the default.

16. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Contract is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal, unenforceable, or void then both parties will be relieved from all obligations arising from that provision. If the remainder of this Contract is capable of being performed, it will not be affected by such determination or finding and must be fully performed.

17. PERFORMANCE, DEFAULT, AND REMEDIES

A. **PERFORMANCE.** During the term of this Contract, the parties will monitor performance and address unresolved contract issues as follows:

1. *Notification.* The parties must promptly notify each other of any known dispute and work in good faith to resolve such dispute within a reasonable period of time. If necessary, Sourcewell and the Supplier will jointly develop a short briefing document that describes the issue(s), relevant impact, and positions of both parties.
2. *Escalation.* If parties are unable to resolve the issue in a timely manner, as specified above, either Sourcewell or Supplier may escalate the resolution of the issue to a higher level of management. The Supplier will have 30 calendar days to cure an outstanding issue.
3. *Performance while Dispute is Pending.* Notwithstanding the existence of a dispute, the Supplier must continue without delay to carry out all of its responsibilities under the Contract that are not affected by the dispute. If the Supplier fails to continue without delay to perform its responsibilities under the Contract, in the accomplishment of all undisputed work, the Supplier will bear any additional costs incurred by Sourcewell and/or its Participating Entities as a result of such failure to proceed.

B. **DEFAULT AND REMEDIES.** Either of the following constitutes cause to declare this Contract, or any Participating Entity order under this Contract, in default:

1. Nonperformance of contractual requirements, or
2. A material breach of any term or condition of this Contract.

The party claiming default must provide written notice of the default, with 30 calendar days to cure the default. Time allowed for cure will not diminish or eliminate any liability for liquidated or other damages. If the default remains after the opportunity for cure, the non-defaulting party may:

- Exercise any remedy provided by law or equity, or
- Terminate the Contract or any portion thereof, including any orders issued against the Contract.

18. INSURANCE

A. REQUIREMENTS. At its own expense, Supplier must maintain insurance policy(ies) in effect at all times during the performance of this Contract with insurance company(ies) licensed or authorized to do business in the State of Minnesota having an "AM BEST" rating of A- or better, with coverage and limits of insurance not less than the following:

1. *Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability.*

Workers' Compensation: As required by any applicable law or regulation.

Employer's Liability Insurance: must be provided in amounts not less than listed below:

Minimum limits:

\$500,000 each accident for bodily injury by accident

\$500,000 policy limit for bodily injury by disease

\$500,000 each employee for bodily injury by disease

2. *Commercial General Liability Insurance.* Supplier will maintain insurance covering its operations, with coverage on an occurrence basis, and must be subject to terms no less broad than the Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Commercial General Liability Form CG0001 (2001 or newer edition), or equivalent. At a minimum, coverage must include liability arising from premises, operations, bodily injury and property damage, independent contractors, products-completed operations including construction defect, contractual liability, blanket contractual liability, and personal injury and advertising injury. All required limits, terms and conditions of coverage must be maintained during the term of this Contract.

Minimum Limits:

\$1,000,000 each occurrence Bodily Injury and Property Damage

\$1,000,000 Personal and Advertising Injury

\$2,000,000 aggregate for Products-Completed operations

\$2,000,000 general aggregate

3. *Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance.* During the term of this Contract, Supplier will maintain insurance covering all owned, hired, and non-owned automobiles in limits of liability not less than indicated below. The coverage must be subject to terms

no less broad than ISO Business Auto Coverage Form CA 0001 (2010 edition or newer), or equivalent.

Minimum Limits:

\$1,000,000 each accident, combined single limit

4. *Umbrella Insurance*. During the term of this Contract, Supplier will maintain umbrella coverage over Employer's Liability, Commercial General Liability, and Commercial Automobile.

Minimum Limits:

\$2,000,000

5. *Network Security and Privacy Liability Insurance*. During the term of this Contract, Supplier will maintain coverage for network security and privacy liability. The coverage may be endorsed on another form of liability coverage or written on a standalone policy. The insurance must cover claims which may arise from failure of Supplier's security resulting in, but not limited to, computer attacks, unauthorized access, disclosure of not public data – including but not limited to, confidential or private information, transmission of a computer virus, or denial of service.

Minimum limits:

\$2,000,000 per occurrence

\$2,000,000 annual aggregate

Failure of Supplier to maintain the required insurance will constitute a material breach entitling Sourcewell to immediately terminate this Contract for default.

B. CERTIFICATES OF INSURANCE. Prior to commencing under this Contract, Supplier must furnish to Sourcewell a certificate of insurance, as evidence of the insurance required under this Contract. Prior to expiration of the policy(ies), renewal certificates must be mailed to Sourcewell, 202 12th Street Northeast, P.O. Box 219, Staples, MN 56479 or sent to the Sourcewell Supplier Development Administrator assigned to this Contract. The certificates must be signed by a person authorized by the insurer(s) to bind coverage on their behalf.

Failure to request certificates of insurance by Sourcewell, or failure of Supplier to provide certificates of insurance, in no way limits or relieves Supplier of its duties and responsibilities in this Contract.

C. ADDITIONAL INSURED ENDORSEMENT AND PRIMARY AND NON-CONTRIBUTORY INSURANCE CLAUSE. Supplier agrees to list Sourcewell and its Participating Entities, including their officers, agents, and employees, as an additional insured under the Supplier's commercial general liability insurance policy with respect to liability arising out of activities, "operations," or "work" performed by or on behalf of Supplier, and products and completed operations of Supplier. The policy provision(s) or endorsement(s) must further provide that coverage is

primary and not excess over or contributory with any other valid, applicable, and collectible insurance or self-insurance in force for the additional insureds.

D. **WAIVER OF SUBROGATION.** Supplier waives and must require (by endorsement or otherwise) all its insurers to waive subrogation rights against Sourcewell and other additional insureds for losses paid under the insurance policies required by this Contract or other insurance applicable to the Supplier or its subcontractors. The waiver must apply to all deductibles and/or self-insured retentions applicable to the required or any other insurance maintained by the Supplier or its subcontractors. Where permitted by law, Supplier must require similar written express waivers of subrogation and insurance clauses from each of its subcontractors.

E. **UMBRELLA/EXCESS LIABILITY/SELF-INSURED RETENTION.** The limits required by this Contract can be met by either providing a primary policy or in combination with umbrella/excess liability policy(ies), or self-insured retention.

19. COMPLIANCE

A. **LAWS AND REGULATIONS.** All Equipment, Products, or Services provided under this Contract must comply fully with applicable federal laws and regulations, and with the laws in the states and provinces in which the Equipment, Products, or Services are sold.

B. **LICENSES.** Supplier must maintain a valid and current status on all required federal, state/provincial, and local licenses, bonds, and permits required for the operation of the business that the Supplier conducts with Sourcewell and Participating Entities.

20. BANKRUPTCY, DEBARMENT, OR SUSPENSION CERTIFICATION

Supplier certifies and warrants that it is not in bankruptcy or that it has previously disclosed in writing certain information to Sourcewell related to bankruptcy actions. If at any time during this Contract Supplier declares bankruptcy, Supplier must immediately notify Sourcewell in writing.

Supplier certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from programs operated by the State of Minnesota; the United States federal government or the Canadian government, as applicable; or any Participating Entity. Supplier certifies and warrants that neither it nor its principals have been convicted of a criminal offense related to the subject matter of this Contract. Supplier further warrants that it will provide immediate written notice to Sourcewell if this certification changes at any time.

21. PROVISIONS FOR NON-UNITED STATES FEDERAL ENTITY PROCUREMENTS UNDER UNITED STATES FEDERAL AWARDS OR OTHER AWARDS

Participating Entities that use United States federal grant or FEMA funds to purchase goods or services from this Contract may be subject to additional requirements including the procurement standards of the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, 2 C.F.R. § 200. Participating Entities may have additional requirements based on specific funding source terms or conditions. Within this Article, all references to "federal" should be interpreted to mean the United States federal government. The following list only applies when a Participating Entity accesses Supplier's Equipment, Products, or Services with United States federal funds.

A. **EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.** Except as otherwise provided under 41 C.F.R. § 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 C.F.R. §60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, "Equal Employment Opportunity" (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 C.F.R. §, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, "Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity," and implementing regulations at 41 C.F.R. § 60, "Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor." The equal opportunity clause is incorporated herein by reference.

B. **DAVIS-BACON ACT, AS AMENDED (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3148).** When required by federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. § 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction"). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 3, "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States"). The Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the federal awarding agency. Supplier must be in compliance with all applicable Davis-Bacon Act provisions.

C. CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT (40 U.S.C. § 3701-3708). Where applicable, all contracts awarded by the non-federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 C.F.R. § 5). Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702 of the Act, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. The requirements of 40 U.S.C. § 3704 are applicable to construction work and provide that no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous or dangerous. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence. This provision is hereby incorporated by reference into this Contract. Supplier certifies that during the term of an award for all contracts by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Supplier must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

D. RIGHTS TO INVENTIONS MADE UNDER A CONTRACT OR AGREEMENT. If the federal award meets the definition of "funding agreement" under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the recipient or subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that "funding agreement," the recipient or subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. § 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency. Supplier certifies that during the term of an award for all contracts by Sourcewell resulting from this procurement process, Supplier must comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

E. CLEAN AIR ACT (42 U.S.C. § 7401-7671q.) AND THE FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT (33 U.S.C. § 1251-1387). Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 require the non-federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. § 7401- 7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251- 1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Supplier certifies that during the term of this Contract will comply with applicable requirements as referenced above.

F. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION (EXECUTIVE ORDERS 12549 AND 12689). A contract award (see 2 C.F.R. § 180.220) must not be made to parties listed on the government wide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with the OMB guidelines at 2 C.F.R. § 180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 C.F.R. § 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 C.F.R. § 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names

of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. Supplier certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation by any federal department or agency.

G. BYRD ANTI-LOBBYING AMENDMENT, AS AMENDED (31 U.S.C. § 1352). Suppliers must file any required certifications. Suppliers must not have used federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Suppliers must disclose any lobbying with non-federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-federal award. Suppliers must file all certifications and disclosures required by, and otherwise comply with, the Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. § 1352).

H. RECORD RETENTION REQUIREMENTS. To the extent applicable, Supplier must comply with the record retention requirements detailed in 2 C.F.R. § 200.333. The Supplier further certifies that it will retain all records as required by 2 C.F.R. § 200.333 for a period of 3 years after grantees or subgrantees submit final expenditure reports or quarterly or annual financial reports, as applicable, and all other pending matters are closed.

I. ENERGY POLICY AND CONSERVATION ACT COMPLIANCE. To the extent applicable, Supplier must comply with the mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the state energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act.

J. BUY AMERICAN PROVISIONS COMPLIANCE. To the extent applicable, Supplier must comply with all applicable provisions of the Buy American Act. Purchases made in accordance with the Buy American Act must follow the applicable procurement rules calling for free and open competition.

K. ACCESS TO RECORDS (2 C.F.R. § 200.336). Supplier agrees that duly authorized representatives of a federal agency must have access to any books, documents, papers and records of Supplier that are directly pertinent to Supplier's discharge of its obligations under this Contract for the purpose of making audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcriptions. The right also includes timely and reasonable access to Supplier's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion relating to such documents.

L. PROCUREMENT OF RECOVERED MATERIALS (2 C.F.R. § 200.322). A non-federal entity that is a state agency or agency of a political subdivision of a state and its contractors must comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation

and Recovery Act. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 C.F.R. § 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition, where the purchase price of the item exceeds \$10,000 or the value of the quantity acquired during the preceding fiscal year exceeded \$10,000; procuring solid waste management services in a manner that maximizes energy and resource recovery; and establishing an affirmative procurement program for procurement of recovered materials identified in the EPA guidelines.

M. FEDERAL SEAL(S), LOGOS, AND FLAGS. The Supplier not use the seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of Federal agency officials without specific pre-approval.

N. NO OBLIGATION BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. The U.S. federal government is not a party to this Contract or any purchase by an Participating Entity and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities to the Participating Entity, Supplier, or any other party pertaining to any matter resulting from the Contract or any purchase by an authorized user.

O. PROGRAM FRAUD AND FALSE OR FRAUDULENT STATEMENTS OR RELATED ACTS. The Contractor acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to the Supplier's actions pertaining to this Contract or any purchase by a Participating Entity.

P. FEDERAL DEBT. The Supplier certifies that it is non-delinquent in its repayment of any federal debt. Examples of relevant debt include delinquent payroll and other taxes, audit disallowance, and benefit overpayments.

Q. CONFLICTS OF INTEREST. The Supplier must notify the U.S. Office of General Services, Sourcewell, and Participating Entity as soon as possible if this Contract or any aspect related to the anticipated work under this Contract raises an actual or potential conflict of interest (as described in 2 C.F.R. Part 200). The Supplier must explain the actual or potential conflict in writing in sufficient detail so that the U.S. Office of General Services, Sourcewell, and Participating Entity are able to assess the actual or potential conflict; and provide any additional information as necessary or requested.

Subject/Discussion:

Staff has found that the properties listed in Exhibit “A” are in violation of Lemoore Municipal Code Title Four Chapter Two and would like to proceed with the weed abatement process to alleviate any hazards or health concerns.

After approval of the resolution, staff will prepare notices to be posted on or in front of the property. Notices shall be posted at least five (5) days prior to the time of hearing. The public hearing would provide an opportunity for testimony from citizens, considering any and all objections to the removal of weeds, grasses, and other fire hazards.

Financial Consideration(s):

Financial impact is unknown at this time. If the City must contract for removal of weeds, the City initially bears the costs. The costs are passed on to the property owners in the form of a lien against the property and will be reimbursed with the next year’s taxes.

The City may also use staff to abate the properties, keeping a detailed record of the charges to be assessed as a lien and recouped when taxes are received, and file a lien against the property following Council approval of the amounts to be collected.

Dear Assemblymen Devon Mathis:

The City of Lemoore writes to express our opposition to SB 423, which would greatly expand SB 35 (Chapter 366, Statutes of 2017), extend the Jan. 1, 2026 sunset date to Jan.1, 2036, and allow the Department of General Services (DGS) to control housing developments on state-owned or -leased property, regardless of the locally required zoning or development standards.

The City of Lemoore intimately understands the affordable housing and homelessness crisis as it plays out in our community every day. Local leaders are working to find creative solutions so homes of all income levels can be built. They're taking on these difficult and complex tasks, and in many cases successfully planning for more than 2.5 million new homes statewide, all while navigating the state's annual barrage of overreaching housing bills that have thus far demonstrated limited success.

SB 423 is the latest overreaching bill. This measure would double-down on the recent trend of the state overriding its own mandated local housing plans by forcing cities to approve certain housing projects without regard to the needs of the community, opportunities for environmental review, or public input. While it may be frustrating for some developers to address neighborhood concerns about traffic, parking, and other development impacts, those directly affected by such projects have a right to be heard. Dear The Honorable Melissa Hurtado:

The City of Lemoore writes to express our opposition to AB 309 (Lee), unless it is amended to address our concerns. AB 309 would create the Social Housing Program within the Department of General Services (DGS) to facilitate the construction of government-owned housing on leased state property or excess state-owned property. Cities would have no ability to regulate zoning or development standards, including floor area ratios, height limitations, or density requirements.

City of Lemoore strongly supports the intent of AB 309, which is to produce more housing as housing affordability and homelessness are among the most critical issues facing California cities. Affordably priced homes are out of reach for many people and housing is not being built fast enough to meet the current or projected needs of people living in the state. Cities lay the essential groundwork for housing production by planning and zoning new projects in their communities based on extensive public input and engagement, as well as state housing laws. Importantly, cities are currently updating housing plans to identify sites for more than 2.5 million additional housing units.

AB 309 would disregard this state-mandated planning process and specifically empower DGS to make land use and zoning decisions on state excess property. If DGS can approve housing, why should cities go through the multiyear planning process to identify sites suitable for new housing units if the state can ignore those plans and build housing on sites never considered for new housing?

While AB 309 currently limits DGS authority to three housing projects on declared excess state property suitable for housing, the measure broadly establishes the Social Housing Program within DGS and could be easily expanded to include all state-owned lands.

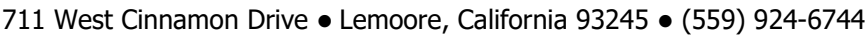
Bypassing California's longstanding housing planning laws and local rules is not a way out of the housing crisis. That's why Cal Cities continues to call on the Governor and lawmakers to annually invest \$3 billion to help cities prevent and reduce homelessness and spur affordable housing development. Targeted, ongoing funding is the only way cities can find community-based solutions that produce housing at all income levels.

For these reasons, City of Lemoore respectfully opposes AB 309 unless it is amended to address our concerns.

Conduct a public hearing, accept Engineer's Report and adopt Resolution 2023-22 and Resolution 2023-23, confirming the diagram and assessment of the annual levy for Fiscal Year 2023-2024 for Landscape and Lighting Maintenance District Number 1, Zones 1 through 13 and Public Facilities Maintenance District Number 1, Zones 1 through 10.

The Engineer's Report prepared by Willdan Financial Services documenting the need for and costs of the proposed assessments, was presented to City Council on June 27, 2023, and presentation was provided to Council and the public earlier this evening during a study session. The Engineer's Report is the basis for the adoption of Resolutions confirming the diagram and assessment of annual levies for fiscal year 2023-2024 within Zones 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8A, 8B, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13 of the City of Lemoore Landscape and Lighting Maintenance District Number 1 (LLMD) and Zones 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 of the City of Lemoore Public Facilities Maintenance District Number 1 (PFMD).

The levies collected for the LLMD zones support the landscape contractors, water meter and consumption charges, the PG&E charges to run the water meters, and the fees paid to the third party consultant for the generation of the assessment reports. The only exception to this occurs in LLMD 08B, which also include the lighting fixture and PG&E costs associated with the lighting fixtures.

The levies collected for the PFMD zones support the same types of services listed for the LLMD zones in addition to road maintenance and rehabilitation, park maintenance and rehabilitation, lighting fixtures, PG&E charges for the light fixtures, along with any shared block walls.

In order to assure each zone has enough funding for large road maintenance projects and any landscape rehabilitation projects in the future, the City collects a certain amount of funds to be placed in the reserve balance each year in addition to the fees for the current years' operating costs.

The levies for fiscal year 2023-2024 differ in each zone due to varying amounts of facilities and improvements to be maintained, the number of housing units responsible for the maintenance, the estimated long term costs, and by how much each zone currently has in its reserve balance. Listed below, by zone, are the current levies and the proposed levies.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-05

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEMOORE
AMENDING PARAGRAPH 4 OF TITLE 7, CHAPTER 11, SECTION 7-11-7, OF THE
LEMOORE MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO PUBLIC PARKS AND
RECREATIONAL AREAS**

WHEREAS, the Municipal Code of the City of Lemoore contains certain terms and conditions regarding the use of city parks and recreational areas;

WHEREAS, there has been increased use of tobacco and smoking related products in and around city parks and recreational areas;

WHEREAS, city parks and recreational areas have been littered with tobacco and smoking related products;

WHEREAS, the use of tobacco and smoking related products near and around our community youth should be prohibited; and

WHEREAS, it is in the interest of the people of the City of Lemoore to amend the Lemoore Municipal Code to prohibit the use of tobacco and smoking related products in areas where our youth congregate and play.

**NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEMOORE DOES
ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

SECTION 1. Paragraph 4 of Title 7, Chapter 11, Section 7-11-7 of the Lemoore Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1.

A. No person in a park or recreational area shall:

4. In or within fifty feet (50') of any public park or recreational area including, but not limited to any grass, sidewalk, covered area or playground area, possess or smoke a lighted or burning tobacco or tobacco related product, or any other lighted weed or plant, including, but not limited to, cigars, cigarettes and pipes; or dispose of any lighted or unlighted tobacco or tobacco related product in any place other than a designated waste disposal container.

SECTION 2. The City Council declares that each provision of this ordinance is severable and independent of every other provision. If any portion of this ordinance is held invalid, the City Council declares that it would have adopted the remaining provisions of this ordinance irrespective of the portion held invalid, and further declares its express intent that the remaining provisions of this ordinance should remain in effect after the invalid portion has been eliminated.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption.

SECTION 4. If a summary of the ordinance is published, then the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy of the full text of the proposed ordinance to be posted in the office of the City Clerk at least five (5) days prior to the Council meeting at which the ordinance is adopted, and again after the meeting at which the ordinance is adopted. The summary shall be approved by the City Attorney. The foregoing Ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Lemoore held on the 1st day of August 2023 and was passed and adopted at a regular meeting of the City Council held on the 15th day of August 2023 by the following vote:

Every year, the League of California Cities convenes a member-driven General Assembly at the [Cal Cities Annual Conference and Expo](#). The General Assembly is an important opportunity where city officials can directly participate in the development of Cal Cities policy.

Taking place on Sept. 22, the General Assembly is comprised of voting delegates appointed by each member city; every city has one voting delegate. Your appointed voting delegate plays an important role during the General Assembly by representing your city and voting on resolutions.

To cast a vote during the General Assembly, your city must designate a voting delegate and up to two alternate voting delegates, one of whom may vote if the designated voting delegate is unable to serve in that capacity. Voting delegates may either be an elected or appointed official.

Please complete the attached voting delegate form and email it to Cal Cities office no later than Monday, August 28.

New this year, we will host a pre-conference information session for voting delegates to explain their role. Submitting your voting delegate form by the deadline will allow us time to establish voting delegate/alternate records prior to the conference and provide pre-conference communications with voting delegates.

Please view Cal Cities' [event and meeting policy](#) in advance of the conference.

Action by Council Required. Consistent with Cal Cities bylaws, a city's voting delegate and up to two alternates must be designated by the city council. When completing the attached Voting Delegate form, please attach either a copy of the council resolution that reflects the council action taken or have your city clerk or mayor sign the form affirming that the names provided are those selected by the city council.

Please note that designating the voting delegate and alternates **must** be done by city council action and cannot be accomplished by individual action of the mayor or city manager alone.

Conference Registration Required. The voting delegate and alternates must be registered to attend the conference. They need not register for the entire conference; they may register for Friday only. Conference registration is open on the [Cal Cities](#) website.

For a city to cast a vote, one voter must be present at the General Assembly and in possession of the voting delegate card and voting tool. Voting delegates and alternates need to pick up their conference badges before signing in and picking up the voting delegate card at the voting delegate desk. This will enable them to receive the special sticker on their name badges that will admit the voting delegate into the voting area during the General Assembly.

Transferring Voting Card to Non-Designated Individuals Not Allowed. The voting delegate card may be transferred freely between the voting delegate and alternates, but *only* between the voting delegate and alternates. If the voting delegate and alternates find themselves unable to attend the General Assembly, they may *not* transfer the voting card to another city official.

Seating Protocol during General Assembly. At the General Assembly, individuals with a voting card will sit in a designated area. Admission to the voting area will be limited to the individual in possession of the voting card and with a special sticker on their name badge identifying them as a voting delegate.

The voting delegate desk, located in the conference registration area of the SAFE Credit Union Convention Center in Sacramento, will be open at the following times: Wednesday, Sept. 20, 8:00 a.m.- 6:00 p.m. and Thursday, Sept. 21, 7:30 a.m.- 4:00 p.m. On Friday, Sept. 22, the voting delegate desk will be open at the General Assembly, starting at 7:30 a.m., but will be closed during roll calls and voting.

The voting procedures that will be used at the conference are attached to this memo. Please share these procedures and this memo with your council and especially with the individuals that your council designates as your city's voting delegate and alternates.

General Assembly Voting Guidelines

1. **One City One Vote.** Each member city has a right to cast one vote on matters pertaining to Cal Cities policy.
2. **Designating a City Voting Representative.** Prior to the Cal Cities Annual Conference and Expo, each city council may designate a voting delegate and up to two alternates; these individuals are identified on the voting delegate form provided to the Cal Cities Credentials Committee.
3. **Registering with the Credentials Committee.** The voting delegate, or alternates, may pick up the city's voting card at the voting delegate desk in the conference registration area. Voting delegates and alternates must sign in at the voting delegate desk. Here they will receive a special sticker on their name badge and thus be admitted to the voting area at the General Assembly.
4. **Signing Initiated Resolution Petitions.** Only those individuals who are voting delegates (or alternates), and who have picked up their city's voting card by providing a signature to the credentials committee at the voting delegate desk, may sign petitions to initiate a resolution.
5. **Voting.** To cast the city's vote, a city official must have in their possession the city's voting card and voting tool; and be registered with the credentials committee. The voting card may be transferred freely between the voting delegate and alternates but may not be transferred to another city official who is neither a voting delegate nor alternate.
6. **Voting Area at General Assembly.** At the General Assembly, individuals with a voting card will sit in a designated area. Admission to the voting area will be limited to the individual in possession of the voting card and with a special sticker on their name badge identifying them as a voting delegate.
7. **Resolving Disputes.** In case of dispute, the credentials committee will determine the validity of signatures on petitioned resolutions and the right of a city official to vote at the General Assembly.

How it works: Cal Cities Resolutions and the General Assembly

Developing League of California Cities policy is a dynamic process that engages a wide range of members to ensure that we are representing California cities with one voice. These policies directly guide Cal Cities advocacy to promote local decision-making, and lobby against statewide policy that erodes local control.

The resolutions process and General Assembly is one way that city officials can directly participate in the development of Cal Cities policy. If a resolution is approved at the General Assembly, it becomes official Cal Cities policy. Here's how Resolutions and the General Assembly works.

Prior to the Annual Conference and Expo

General Resolutions



Sixty days before the Annual Conference and Expo, Cal Cities members may submit policy proposals on issues of importance to cities. The resolution must have the concurrence of at least five additional member cities or individual members.

Policy Committees



The Cal Cities President assigns general resolutions to policy committees where members review, debate, and recommend positions for each policy proposal. Recommendations are forwarded to the Resolutions Committee.

During the Annual Conference and Expo

Petitioned Resolutions



The petitioned resolution is an alternate method to introduce policy proposals during the annual conference. The petition must be signed by voting delegates from 10% of member cities, and submitted to the Cal Cities President at least 24 hours before the beginning of the General Assembly.

Resolutions Committee



The Resolutions Committee considers all resolutions. General Resolutions approved¹ by either a policy committee or the Resolutions Committee are next considered by the General Assembly. General resolutions not approved, or referred for further study by both a policy committee and the Resolutions Committee do not go the General Assembly. All Petitioned Resolutions are considered by the General Assembly, unless disqualified.²

General Assembly



During the General Assembly, voting delegates debate and consider general and petitioned resolutions forwarded by the Resolutions Committee. Potential Cal Cities bylaws amendments are also considered at this meeting.

Who's who

Cal Cities policy development is a member-informed process, grounded in the voices and experiences of city officials throughout the state.

The **Resolutions Committee** includes representatives from each Cal Cities diversity caucus, regional division, municipal department, policy committee, as well as individuals appointed by the Cal Cities president.

Voting delegates are appointed by each member city; every city has one voting delegate.

The **General Assembly** is a meeting of the collective body of all voting delegates — one from every member city.

Seven **Policy Committees** meet throughout the year to review and recommend positions to take on bills and regulatory proposals. Policy committees include members from each Cal Cities diversity caucus, regional division, municipal department, as well as individuals appointed by the Cal Cities president.

What's new in 2023?



- Voting delegates will receive increased communications to prepare them for their role during the General Assembly.
- The General Assembly will take place earlier to allow more time for debate and discussion.
- Improvements to the General Assembly process will make it easier for voting delegates to discuss and debate resolutions.

¹ The Resolution Committee can amend a general resolution prior to sending it to the General Assembly.

² Petitioned Resolutions may be disqualified by the Resolutions Committee according to Cal Cities Bylaws Article VI. Sec. 5(f).
